THE MAILS.

Our correspondence indicates that there is, not alone in Charlottetown, but along the line of railway throughout the Province deep interest in the prompt delivery of the mails; and we feel sure that our steamship and post office will receive great credit if they succeed in forwarding letters and papers to their destination without delay. The test of today was a doubly hard one because the steamer was somewhat late arriving and because there was a double mail of 120 bags. Yet the mails were dispatched east and west by the morning trains, and business men in Tignish, Alberton, Souris, Georgetown and all along the line will receive today (November 3rd) their Toronto, Montreal and Boston advices of November first. This is good despatch, putting the business of the Province at large just twenty-four hours ahead of what it otherwise would have been, and we have to congratulate all concerned in it,—especially the officials in the Charlottetown Post Office. The delivery of the Charlottetown mail was necessarily a little slow; but we could well afford to put up with the delay. Our greatest regret is that passengers from Nova Scotia were delayed at Pictou and otherwise inconvenienced. In future, persons crossing from Halifax and St. John and intermediate points may leave in the afternoon and, with out any delay at Pictou, arrive in Charlottetown the following morning.

BRITAIN'S PREPARATIONS.

The British Lion is evidently aroused. He is, indeed, so intently watchful that an apparently harmless Russian tourist, who was making some enquiries about the armament of an English fort, was promptly arrested for examination. Those who have lately argued, from the conciliatory and peaceful attitude of the British Government, that "all the fight has gone out of John Bull," will probably be surprised at the present angry and determined demeanor of the British people and the preparations they are making for war. The Russians and the French have evidently counted too much upon the desire of the British people to maintain friendly relations with their neighbors and have pressed their aggressions just a little too far. France must now, of necessity, back out of Fashoda; and we have a shrewd suspicion that Russia will not longer continue her forward policy in China. These powers fully understand that Great Britain has "got the ships, and got the men, and got the money, too;" and they must appreciate the fact that the people of Great Britain have come to the conclusion that a point has been reached at which "forbearance ceases to be a virtue."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Liberal journals continue to write down prohibition. The Ottawa Free Press says "In one part of Georgia the reaction not long ago brought prohibition into operation. It failed miserably."
From the fact that the United States Peace Commissioners at Paris have demanded the cession of the Philippines it has been concluded that the States has decided to be come one of the Great Powers of the world. But perhaps the design of the United States is to sell the Philippines for a sum sufficient to recoup the Spanish war expenditures. Uncle Sam has a keen eye for a trade.

LORD ABERDEEN'S FAREWELL

Some Good Advice: Keep Public out of the Civil Service: Pay the Judges Well

OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—A farewell banquet was given to the governor general by the citizens of Ottawa at the Russell last evening, Judge Taschereau presiding. The function was somewhat exclusive. After the usual loyal toasts, the chairman proposed the health of the guest of the evening in eulogistic terms. Lord Aberdeen, who received a splendid greeting, spoke at considerable length in reply. His observations consisted of a review of the history of Canada during the past five years. Incidentally he touched upon his relations with several prime ministers, and expressed the hope that there would be no further friction on those matters which touched the religious feelings of the community. Proceeding, the governor referred to the better understanding now existing between Canada and the United States. The most striking portion of his speech was that of which he referred to the position in the civil service and urged that politics be kept out of the public service. He would like to see the patronage system abolished and positions in the public system acquired by competitive examinations. He urged ample emoluments to the judiciary. The governor general then alluded to the different organizations with which their excellencies names had been prominently associated, such as the National Council of Women, the Victorian Order of Nurses, and the Aberdeen Society for the dissemination of good literature among settlers in the Northwest, and bespoke for these organizations the sympathy of the public. He concluded with a friendly eulogy of his successor. Other speakers followed.
