THE QUEEN'S BIRTH DAY.—To-day (Monday) 25th May, has been set apart for the commemoration of the birth of Her Majesty the Queen, and a public holiday has been proclaimed.

MORE IMMIGRANTS FOR NEW BRUNSWICK.—The steamer *Capitan* brought 350 immigrants bound to Dalhousie, where the steamer will land them on their way to Quebec. The immigrants are reported to be a healthy lot of people, and a valuable acquisition to New Brunswick.

THE HON. AMNESTY.—Sir Benjamin Carter, confidential secretary to St. George Sutherland, has been examined before the North West Committee. It is said that his evidence conclusively establishes the fact that an amnesty was promised by Carter when he was chief of the government, during the illness of Sir John Macdonald.

MR. P. CONNOLLY who has been twenty-eight years a Livery Stable Keeper in St. John N. B., has rented the extensive property lately occupied by Judge Reddin. By the time the Railroad is in operation he will have established a first class premises, of which the carriages and harness he has now on exhibition are full warrant. There is a *barouche* of New York manufacture and also a double seated carriage of New Brunswick manufacture now on the premises, both splendidly furnished. We hope Mr. Connolly will be furnished with the patronage his efforts deserve.

THE SENATE.—On Monday morning last, the debate in the Upper House, on the dismissal of public officials, was resumed and, in the course of it, Hon. Mr. Penny said, it would be ridiculous for that House to pass a vote of censure on a Government which was sustained in the other House by upwards of a hundred majority. It seems to us, that if our Senators are to regulate their sentiments by the Governments majority in the Lower House, the sooner they are abolished the better, for we have all along been under the impression that the Senate was a body independent of the Commons, whose function were, to check the legislation and acts of the Government by an independent vote and expression of opinion on every subject which came before them.—*Toronto Leader*.

THE AMATEUR DRAMATIC CLUB IS SUMMERSIDE.—Some persons having spoken disparagingly concerning the Amateur Dramatic Club of this city, on the occasion of their late misadventure. We think the following from the *Summerside Journal* will be satisfactory evidence that such statements are founded.

"On Friday and Saturday evenings, the Charlottetown Amateur Dramatic Club performed in the Drill School, (Mr. Peck's) well rendered, especially "Handy Andy." All the leading characters were splendidly sustained and highly creditable. We feel assured that every one was well pleased with the entertainment. In fact we may go so far as to say, that it was a good deal better than many professional concerts, as it has visited our Island. It is strange that the young men of Summerside do not organize themselves into a club similar to the above. The material, we are sure, can be easily found, and it would be time profitably spent. SCHOONER "PRINCE EDWARD."—We are glad to learn, that on the 14th inst., this fine schooner was got off the beach on Sand Islands, where she has been stranded in the gale of last December, and safely brought to the wharf at Cassequep. This vessel is not much injured—a few of the bolts of the planks having been started, and in consequence opened. When these are fastened, and the vessel properly caulked, this strongly built and well fitted schooner, as good as when she was launched. Unfortunately for her enterprising successful commander and owner, Capt. Costain, the insurance on the "Princed" had expired a few days before she was stranded, which entailed upon him a serious loss. As a rule, it is wise for ship owners to keep their vessels insured all the time. We hope we may meet with no further mishap. Capt. Costain commenced life a few years ago by trading in a small boat. He now owns the "Winnie" and "Princed" and has been, during the past winter, preparing material for building a West India trader. Such has, with him, been the rest of honest hard industry. We wish him ever success.—*Summerside Journal*.

DEBATE IN THE SCHOOL QUESTION.

Mr. ISAAC said that the question before the committee was one of great importance. The present Education Act very much requires amendment, and he earnestly hoped that hon. members on both sides of the House would give the matter their full consideration. The amendments proposed in the resolution should be approved and discussed with "animus, and with an earnest desire to do justice to all religious denominations. It could not be denied that this question was of vital importance, as it affected the educational interests of the whole community, and had been the means of giving rise to the comment. He believed that if not settled in some way or other, it would continue to give governments as much trouble in the future as it had in the past. As long as it remained a standing grievance, so long would it be agitated and means used to secure justice to Roman Catholics. He hoped that during the discussion of the question, the committee would arrive at some plan, or devise some means to settle the matter, in some way, that justice would be done to all denominations.

Mr. WELSH referred to the remark of the hon. member for East Point regarding the doctrine of might makes right. He said that the Government had given up its claim of right and justice to his district, and yet they brought forward this argument now.

Mr. L. H. DAVIES.—The hon. member for East Point had attributed many evils to liberalism. He had said that rebellion, anarchy, riot and treason followed in its wake. The hon. member read history backward. He (Mr. D.) trusted that some one would carry to the Bishop the intelligence that he had been lectured by one of his own people, and that the reason he did not obtain what he demanded was not because his demand was unjust, but because he had not suited his views to those of the hon. member for East Point; because he had not looked through different political spectacles a few months ago. No language could convey a greater insult to the Bishop than that of the hon. member for East Point. In one breath he had said that the demand was just, in the next, that the political exigencies of himself and his party prevented his voting for it. What a position he placed himself in! If (Mr. D.) believed the demand just he would vote for it whether it involved his political ruin or elevation. He did not believe it was just. When the Solicitor General proved it to be so he would vote for it, but he would not come before the House and say in effect that he believed the demand just, but if he supported it he would lose his little office. Any one who told the House that the demand was just, and yet voted against it, committed a crime against the views he held and against the people of the Colony. If the Attorney General believed the demand just, he should have voted for it even if it sank his political power.

Hon. Mr. BROWN.—And violate his pledge?

Mr. L. H. DAVIES.—He had a few days ago said that he was returned to the House, he had been pledged previous to the last election, but not at the last. He was in a most extraordinary position. He had acknowledged the demand to be just, but could not support it. He had said that he thereby displeased some of his political supporters. Did he suppose that saying this would conciliate the Roman Catholics. If it did they were of a meaner mental calibre than he (Mr. D.) was. He had said that he was satisfied with such honied words, which turned to gall afterwards? Those who held that the present system was rotten and unfair were in the position of the hon. member for East Point. And yet they were held up as the acme of everything great and good. The hon. member for St. John's (Mr. McLean), had been taunted for having introduced a resolution a few years ago, but what was the reception which that resolution met with? Would it be believed that these people who acknowledged that injustice existed, refused even to allow it to be discussed, or to refer to it? The hon. member to state his reason for introducing it? They were in power and it was more important that they should remain so than that the evils complained of should be remedied, and they did not do so. And yet they were held up as the acme of everything great and good.

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PERSONAL.—Daniel Davies, Esq., M.P., arrived home on Friday evening. A telegram to the *Patriot* reports that McIntyre and Perry left Ottawa on Saturday morning.

The *Thetis* took her, on the 15th inst., from Philadelphia, four locomotives, and 128 packages of the various pieces of machinery to complete the same.

On Thursday, the 21st inst., there were shipped to Boston, in two schooners, about 7,500 bushels of potatoes; and to Philadelphia, in another schooner, 5,532 bushels.

Brigantine *Italia*, Graham, Master, from Liverpool, England, bound to Georgetown, ran ashore near Irving's Crpe, Murray Harbor, on Saturday night last. The above vessel has a valuable cargo of merchandise, salt, &c., for Hon. Daniel Gordon, who is also owner of the vessel, neither of which are insured.—*Herald*, May 20.

EXTRACTS.—Hon. L. C. Owen shipped to England, on Friday and Saturday last, 32,500 bushels of oats, and a quantity of deals, value for \$17,056.00. And the Messrs. Peake, Bros. & Co. forwarded to the same destination, 12,000 bushels oats, and 11,000 feet 3 inch deal.

THE HANCOCK.—The steamer *Hanko* arrived from Montreal on the 23d, with 13 cases hats and caps, 23 do dry goods, 25 packages oils, paints and varnish, 65 keg seeds, 55 cases boots and shoes, 3 cases of clothing, 168 bales paper 202 packages cordage, 25 kegs nails, 296 packages of sundries, and 4,544 barrels flour.

STEAMERS.—The *Hanko* from Montreal, with 4,544 bbls flour and other goods (for dealers here), arrived on Friday. She will leave this evening, the *Columbia* with 1100 bbls flour arrived this morning. The *Carroll*, from Boston and Halifax, (with general cargo and passengers) arrived on Wednesday and left on Thursday.
