MORE SHIPMENTS.—The Summerside Pioneer says: Two hundred sheep were sent over in the St. Lawrence by Mr. John Avar, three horses by Mr. W. Drummond for Newcastle and one by Mr. Wm. McKay for Amherst on Thursday, and on the following day Mr. McKay sent over four more for the same place, while Mr. Geo. B. McKay, of Clifton, sent over one for Athol, N. B. On this latter day 44 sheep were shipped by Mr. James Kane for St. John. On Saturday again 100 sheep were sent away by Mr. Thomas Drummond for the St. John market, one horse was also sent by Mr. James Kane. These will, in all probability, complete the shipments of horses and sheep by this route for this season.

ABOUT PIGS.—The Agriculturist says: Mr. G. R. McMahon, station master at Emerald, killed last week a seven months old porker which turned the scale at the high figure of 278 pounds. This is certainly good work—over 1 1/2 pounds a day. Mr. McMahon got this pig from the stock farm of Mr. John O'Ronaghan, of Shalimar Cottage, Kinkora, when only three weeks old. We understand that Mr. O'Ronaghan has others of the same litter which now weigh 500 pounds. Mr. Thomas Andrews, St. Eleanors, has imported from the United States a trio of Medium Yorkshire pigs, for breeding purposes. They came by the Carroll, on her last trip to Charlottetown. On arrival here, they were examined by Mr. J. A. Gourlie, V. S., who pronounced them free from disease of any kind.

On Trial for Murder.

St. John, Dec. 8.—The trial of Wm. J. McDonald for the murder of Mrs. McRae was commenced yesterday morning, but practically no progress was made as the whole jury panel was exhausted and only one jurymen secured. By agreement between counsel the Judge discharged the man, as it was not deemed right to keep the one jurymen locked up in charge of a constable over Sunday. The Judge ordered the Sheriff to summon one hundred jurymen for Monday morning. It is believed the task of securing a jury will be a difficult one, as nearly every citizen has expressed a strong opinion on the case and all unfavorable to the prisoner.

Dried Meat Company.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—A Company, to be known as "The Canadian Dried Meat Co., Limited," has been formed in England, with the object of acquiring concession by the corporation of Three Rivers, Que., of one hundred acres of freehold land, subject to the erection thereupon of abattoirs and other buildings at a minimum cost of £20,000, which land, with all buildings thereon, are to be free from all taxation for a period of 99 years, so long as the works are in operation, to purchase live stock and to kill and dress the same for shipment and otherwise.

May Not Return.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—It is stated at Montreal that Mr. Dubail, consul-general at France, whose six months leave of absence has long since expired, may not return to his post because France feels offended at the action of the Government in deciding that Canada should not take part in the exhibition, and to insulting remarks made by certain Canadian newspapers to the French Republic.

A Clergyman in Trouble.

Columbus, Dec. 8.—Rev. W. F. Pettit, Methodist clergyman, who came here two weeks ago from Indiana, has been arrested here on the charge of poisoning his wife who died last July. He declares his innocence, and expresses a desire for an immediate trial. He returned to Indiana without requisition papers.

The Story Denounced.

New York, Dec. 8.—Archbishop Corrigan denounces as a canard the story printed on Saturday morning to the effect that a gigantic Roman Catholic bank and trust company is going to be started in this city with a capital of \$100,000,000, under the special benediction of the Pope.

Coasting Privileges.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—It is reported on pretty good authority that the objectionable portion of the recently issued order regarding the coasting privileges enjoyed by United States vessels on the Pacific, has been revoked.

Against Cholera.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—Dr. Montzambert, Grosse Isle quarantine officer, is here urging the Government to take extra precautionary measures to prevent the introduction of cholera into the Dominion next year.

Lying in State.

New Orleans, Nov. 9.—The body of Jefferson Davis was taken to the City Hall to-day, where it will lie in state. The hall is suitably decorated, and the remains are in a casket with a full length plate glass.

Distinguished Arrivals.

London, Dec. 8.—The str. Alagoas, having on board Dom Pedro and his wife, Prince Pierre, Prince Louis and Prince Antoine, arrived here yesterday morning at 10.15 o'clock.

Recovery Hoped For.

Zanzibar, Dec. 8.—Emin Pasha is still in a dangerous condition, but Dr. Parke hopes for his recovery unless complication sets in.

News Notes.

Reports from every County in the Southern States, where cotton is raised, indicate a total cotton crop for this year of 7,124,000 bales.

Secretary Windom estimates that it will cost \$341,428,977 to run the government machine at Washington for the coming fiscal year.

Ex-King Milan of Servia is at Paris, and intends to make that city his permanent residence. He will live private and abandon politics.

The wheat crop of Russia this year is about 91,000,000 bushels less than that of last year, while the yield of rye, which is much used for bread in Northern Europe, is 35,238,050 bushels short.

The visible supply of wheat in the United States and Canada increased 1,722,000 bushels the past week, and now aggregates 39,124,000 bushels, as compared with 35,238,050 bushels at the corresponding period of last year.
