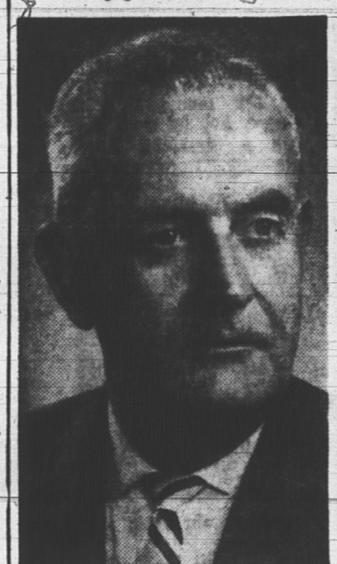

Fire-Flood Method Tried For Freeing Oil From Sand

CALGARY (CP)—About 40 miles northwest of Swift Current, Sask., and some 2,800 feet below the prairie, fire has been raging since late last year.

And, says chief engineer Dwayne M. Coleman, it likely will burn for at least two years before Socody Mobil Oil of Canada Ltd. can say whether it was worth starting it.

The blaze, fanned by compressed air pumped down an old oil well, forms the first application in a commercial Canadian oil field of the "fire flood" method of recovering oil.

In it, heavy crude oil sand moves ahead of an outward-expanding ring of flame, steam and hot water to another well, or wells, where it can be brought to the surface.

Fire-flooding follows experiments with steam and other

heat methods of freeing oil from gluey sands. Oilmen have proposed using underground atomic blasts to achieve the same effect.

'SHOWN SOME RESPONSE' Mobil, in co-operation with six other companies, started the fire test in the Battum oil field in December. Mr. Coleman says the two recovery wells already have "shown some response."

The fire was started at the bottom of a 10-year-old well in which production had been dropping. The recovery wells are at points 600 feet away.

Mobil engineers hope the ring of fire will burn through the entire depth of the Roseray sands in the test area, ranging from 20 to 30 feet at an average speed of about a foot a day. Its speed can be controlled by the amount of air fed to it and

its likely behavior can be estimated from known characteristics of the field, a commercial producer for several years. Says Mr. Coleman: "We won't know until the pilot is complete whether it will be worthwhile to extend it to other areas in the field or the whole field."

When Mobil announced the project last year, it estimated 50 to 80 per cent of the oil in the sands could be recovered by fire flooding, or up to 30 per cent more than by other methods.

TEMPT COMPANIES

Research into fire, steam and steam-caustic methods of freeing oil from sands tempts oil companies because of massive crude oil reserves in sands in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Experts estimate there are 750,000,000 barrels of heavy oil, 19 times total estimated U.S. reserves, in a 600-mile belt across northern Alberta

and stretching into western Saskatchewan.

Much of it can't be covered by conventional methods, among them relying on natural water or gas pressure, or by injecting water or gas into the fields to boost or maintain such pressure.

Estimated reserves remaining in the Roseray sands are about 16,000,000 barrels. But engineers have not estimated the amount under the 20-acre test area, nor what can be recovered.

As the test proceeds, they will evaluate results and "see if it's worth drilling other production wells or putting them in another pattern," Mr. Coleman says. Fire flooding stems from experiments in the 1920s. It began in the U.S. in the early 1950s but Mr. Coleman says there has been "little commercial application except in California."
