No Doubt As To Victor In Red Election

MOSCOW, (Reuters)—Russia's 120,000,000 voters cast ballots Sunday in a national election of 1,331 deputies to the Supreme Soviet—an election which can end only in victory for Premier Georgi Malenkov's government.

The Supreme Soviet is nominally Russia's parliament. It meets only occasionally to rubber stamp Kremlin policy.

The sun shone brightly in spring-like weather as voters donned their "Sunday best" suits and set out for the polling stations. The Supreme Soviet election is really a national holiday—and the vote is expected to exceed 99 per cent of the eligible electors.

While voters had the choice of only a single candidate in each district, they could record negative votes—either by deleting the name on their ballot papers and returning blanks or by writing in a new name.

Free To Oppose

A pair of six Moscow polling stations chosen at random indicated that voters, while restricted to voting for only one candidate, had complete freedom to record negative votes without fear of their identity becoming known.

For this purpose, polling stations are provided with heavily-curtained cubicles with pencils handy for making amendments. The polling clerks did not appear to check the identity of those using the cubicles, and voters wishing to do so could clearly record negative votes. There appeared to be no scrutiny how votes were cast and electors were told to fold their ballot papers before dropping them into the boxes.

At the last election in 1950, 60,000 cast negative votes—about one quarter of one per cent of the total poll.

Mossadegh Crony Stabbed By Mob When Arrested

TEHRAN, (Reuters)—Former foreign minister Hussein Fatemi, captured in a dramatic police raid early Saturday, was later mobbed and stabbed by fanatic supporters of the Shah of Iran.

The howling crowd assaulted Fatemi, the right-hand man of ousted Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, as demonstrations led to Saturday night after preliminary questioning here.

The captive, trembling and ashen faced, was removed to a hospital with two knife wounds in his back.

Cairo radio reported the mob numbered 200 and set on Fatemi before reinforcements could reach him. The radio said he was rescued by troops.

The 35-year-old former official was slated for transfer to Sultana military barracks north of Tehran for lengthy questioning in preparation for a treason trial.

Hunted Relentlessly

As leader of the underground national movement opposing the Shah, Fatemi was hunted relentlessly since Gen. Gazdollah Zohabi overthrew Mossadegh last August.

Army officers brandishing pistols burst into his hideout and startled him from sleep Saturday morning. He offered Mr. Ali Akbar Molavi, who arrested him, much money to let him go.

Molavi—who was promoted to colonel on the spot when he brought in Fatemi—replied "long live the shah, you dog," and led him away in handcuffs.

Police said that all the way to Tehran from his hideout six miles away at Shehran, Fatemi pleaded "Forgive me—spare me."

Crowds of loyal monarchists gathered after his capture to roar "We will tear him limb from limb."

Fatemi apparently had spent the entire period in the back room of a rented house in Shehran, which lies in the foothills of the Elburz mountain range.

Fatemi's nephew, Sayed Fatemi, who led crowds which smashed statues of the shah last August, also gave himself up when he heard his uncle had been taken. He was charged with plotting to overthrow the monarchy and was taken to prison.
