Thirty Pounds Reward!

Penalties for Aiding or Concealing Deserters.

By the Imperial Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion any person who shall by any means whatsoever, directly or indirectly, procure or attempt to procure, or attempt to procure or persuade any Soldier to desert, or attempt to procure or persuade any Soldier to desert, or attempt to procure or persuade any Soldier to desert, shall be deemed to be a deserter, and shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be committed to the Common Jail or House of Correction, there to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for any term not exceeding six calendar months, as the convicting Justice shall think fit.

Any Tavern Keeper or other person suffering a Soldier to remain in his or her house after the hour of six in the evening, from the first of MAY to the 31st of SEPTEMBER, and after the first of OCTOBER to the 30th of APRIL, without a written pass from his commanding Officer, shall forfeit TWENTY SHILLINGS for each and every soldier, with costs of suit.

TWENTY POUNDS PENALTY.

By the Island Statute of 50 George the Third, cap. 3, any person harbouring, concealing or assisting any Deserter from Her Majesty's Army, is liable to a penalty of TWENTY POUNDS. Any Sheriff or his Deputy, or any Constable or Officer or Soldier in Her Majesty's service, are, by this Statute, made liable to the same penalty if they knowingly harbour, conceal or assist any person suspected to be a Deserter, and take him before a Justice of the Peace.

THE REWARD is by the same Act payable for the apprehension of any such Deserters.

NOTICE.

In addition to the Reward for the apprehension of Deserters, payable by an Act of Assembly above mentioned, the sum of SEVEN POUNDS will be added and paid by the Colonial Government, to any Justice of the Peace and Constables throughout the Island are hereby required to give their prompt aid and assistance for the apprehension of the above described Deserters, and the safe conveyance to Head Quarters, Charlottetown.
