

to and authorized by a public meeting; the formation of a police force, and an overseer of streets and public pumps. It would be well not to attempt too much in the first place. Now as to taxes and assessments. The most equitable mode of levying an assessment, is by a rate per cent. on the value of the real and personal estate of the freeholders, householders, and lodgers. If levied upon real estate alone, whether in the possession of the owners or occupiers, it bears unequally, and if upon the occupiers only, is more severe upon the poorer classes than the rich. Whereas if laid on property of all descriptions, every one pays according to his ability, and the back is fitted to the burden. It is of the utmost importance that in the outset the mass of the people should approve of what is done. As Summerside advances and its population increases, an enlargement of the powers of the Trustees will become necessary, but that will be matter for after consideration, in the mean time every expense save those that are absolutely indispensable, should be avoided. If the appointment of a stipendiary magistrate should be agreed to, it is to be hoped that there are many individuals who would accept the office and faithfully perform the duties for the sake of the honor which it would confer, and the benefits that would result from his exertions at the lowest scale of remuneration. The duties would be comparatively light for some time to come. The very fact of there being a properly constituted police force goes of itself to put and keep down evil doers. A resolute man who is known to have a loaded revolver at hand by night and by day, is not likely to be troubled by thieves or burglars. The uncertainty of detection and punishment is the greatest possible encouragement to the lawless and abandoned. We have intimated that a stipendiary magistrate might be four, and would not so much rely on the employment to be derived from holding the office as on considerations of a less selfish nature. Not so, however, with the chief and subordinate constables. They should be fairly and amply recompensed. The chief constable should be a man of acknowledged firmness and decision of character—doing his always unpleasant duty and compelling his fellow-officers to do them, without compulsory violence and hardship. The constables should also be men of sufficient strength both of body and mind, as to cause them to be feared and obeyed.

We have said enough for the present, and will wait the result of the decision of the people if a meeting should be called—and if any proposal for the advancement of the Town, its present and future interests, be agreed upon, in that contingency we shall be happy to contribute all in our power to further the views of the people.

THE SOCIAL TEA in aid of the funds of the Wesleyan Church came off as advertised, on Thursday evening last. It was well patronized. The entertainment in the evening was well attended. The music, recitations, dialogue, &c., were very good. It may be interesting to some of our readers to know that the Wesleyan Church in this place is now out of debt, and have about £40 on hand, to lay out in repairing the building.

SMALL DEBT COURT.—A correspondent informs us that the people of Kensington, Margate, &c., are anxious to have a Small Debt Court established in the former place. At present they find it very inconvenient, the other Courts being at such a distance from them. We think this is no unjust demand, and we would advise the inhabitants to bring the matter before the coming Session of the Legislature, through their representatives.

A PUBLIC MEETING was held in Georgetown on the 14th instant, for the purpose of taking into consideration the requirements of the town. Several resolutions were passed: the first asking for a steamer on the Georgetown ferry; the second for having the telegraph extended to that town; the third for a grant to a steamer to run between Georgetown and Pictou during the winter months while the harbor is open. The subject of the last resolution is of interest to the whole Island, and we trust the Legislature will give it their serious consideration. Let the Members for King's and Prince Counties stand by each other, and they will get all they want.

DOWRY TO BE HANGED.—Dowry, the murderer of Colton, has been sentenced to be hanged in Charlottetown on the 31st of March. By reference to the letter in another column, from an esteemed correspondent in the City, some interesting particulars will be found respecting Dowry.

The letter of "A Teacher," in this day's paper, was mailed for us on the 12th Dec., but did not reach here until last week. Where was it?

The last Herald publishes the correspondence between the Government of this Island and General Butler on the subject of Rectiprocity. We think it has lost its interest, it has been so long in making its appearance.

The Halifax Express of the 29th inst., says P. E. Island potatoes of fair quality are selling from the wharf for 30 cents per bushel. The weather during the past week has been very cold. On Saturday morning last the thermometer was as low as ten degrees below zero.

Resolved, That our Representatives be requested to obtain such amendment to the Election Laws, as will cause a polling division for Electors to be established in Summerside.

After some remarks in reference to the necessity of petitioning for a grant in aid of the purchase of a second fire Engine, for the use of the town, the above committee, with the additional names of R. T. Holman, D. Rogers, J. F. Baker and F. McNeill, Esquires, was appointed to prepare petitions in accordance with the above resolutions, to be presented for signatures at an adjourned meeting on Thursday evening, 28th inst.
