Massacred. CAIRO, Oct. 9. Advice from Tonglon state that the Major of that place has received confirmation of the report that a steamer from Khartoum was wrecked after leaving Abu Hamed, and all on board the vessel landed to try and hire camels. They gave the natives presents, and the natives invited them to their dwellings where they massacred them. It is unknown whether there were any Europeans among the victims.

The Redistribution Bill. LONDON, Oct. 9. The Standard this morning publishes a draft of the Government's proposed Redistribution scheme. By it the representation of England in Parliament is increased to 110, and Scotland 10, while Ireland remains unchanged. The fact that there is to be no gain in the total Irish representation creates much excitement in Ireland.

Terrible and Fatal Cyclone. ROME, Oct. 9. Harrowing details of a cyclone on the Island of Sicily have been received here. Seventy-seven persons were killed and one hundred injured. The damage to property is not at present estimated.

Disturbance. ST. JOHN'S, N.F.L.D., Oct. 9. Orange demonstrations are again developing at Harbor Grace. The gates of the Convent were torn down and flung into the sea. One River-Head man was beaten almost to death by the Orangemen.

In English:—Orthography, Writing from Dictation, Parsing and Analysis, Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography. The Scholarship is of the annual value of \$125, and will be tenable for three years.
