Makes Dangerous Mercy Flight

-Flying at tree-top level for more than 600 miles in rain and snow, a Royal Canadian Air Force crew from Station Summerside performed a daring mercy flight last Saturday. The Dakota aircraft, piloted by Flight Lieutenant Al Morton, of Trenton, B.C., and Flying Officer Bob Hadden, Hortonville, N. S., flew from the Island base to Gaspe Village, Quebec, to carry Mr. John Eden, an English immigrant suffering from polio, to hospital at Montreal. Paralyzed from the waist down, Mr. Eden's condition was aggravated by a collapsed lung which did not allow the pilot to fly at normal altitudes from Gaspe to Montreal. So poor was the weather when the aircraft took off from the Quebec village that the headlights of trucks and cars lining the short gravel runway were used to give the pilots sufficient visibility to take off. After flying through some of the season's worst weather the aircraft arrived at Montreal's Dorval Airport to find it wrapped in fog. The aircraft then flew to the R. C. A. F. airport at St. Hubert, near Montreal, where Eden was admitted to the station hospital pending the arrival of an ambulance from Montreal. F. L. W. A. Woodruff, medical officer at Station Summerside, accompanied the aircraft and provided medical services during the long and dangerous flight. Leading Aircraftman W. H. Organize Community Credit Union In S'ide

An enthusiastic meeting in the Summerside town hall last evening organized a community credit union open to membership from all residents of the town of Summerside and surrounding rural areas within a five mile radius. Officers elected at this meeting are as follows: - Board of Directors: W. Chester MacDonell, Ken Walker, George Chappel, Elwood Campbell, Milton Mellich. Credit Committee: William A. Currie, John Forbes, Harold MacLellan. Supervisory Committee: Russell Hunter, Norman MacDonnell, Rod MacNeivin. Rules and regulations of the new credit union which will be known as the Community Credit Union were discussed and adopted. The meeting, in addition to bonding its officers, took out insurance which gives each member an amount of life insurance equal to the amount of his or her savings; and also took out loan insurance for the new Credit Union which in the event of his or her death or disability, pays to the loan or any such member who has money borrowed from the Credit Union. Membership in the new Credit Union is open to any resident of Summerside or surrounding rural areas for a radius of five miles excluding any rural district in the five mile radius which may now be serviced by a Credit Union. The meeting was addressed by Mr. Don Smith, field representative of the Credit Union National Association, who outlined the benefits of Credit Union participation and made seven recommendations to the new organization. Mr. J. G. Denis, Supervisor of the Credit Union League of Prince Edward Island, also addressed the meeting and outlined the by-laws and other aspects of administration. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Smith, and Mr. W. Chester MacDonell was secretary of the meeting. The Board of Directors will meet this afternoon at 5 p. m. to elect their president, and their treasurer, from the board membership, and to consider other details in regard to membership, and the Credit Union's weekly one-hour business meeting. It was indicated that a person or persons normally located in the down-town business area would assist the treasurer in accepting savings deposits, payments on loans, etc., as an added convenience to the Credit Union members each day of the week. -S.
