CONTRACT BRIDGE

East dealer, North-South vulnerable.

One important factor, sometimes ignored, is the meaning declarer can read into the line of defense his opponents select. What the defenders do, and more particularly what they fail to do, is often very significant.

East cashed two diamonds and then led the ace of spades. Receiving the three from West, he nevertheless played another spade, taken with the queen.

Declarer now had only a trump loser to contend with. Scoring the trump finesse, South made no effort to get to his hand to take it. He led the ace, caught the king, and made the contract.

It was by no means just a lucky shot. The play was strictly based on East's defense. It was clear to everyone at the table that West had started with two diamonds and was in ruffing position.

The bidding:
East South West North
1♦ Pass Pass 4♥
3♦ 3♥ Pass 4♠

Opening lead—three of diamonds.

The declarer, in most hands, has many clues to help guide him to the best way to play a hand. If the opponents have bid, he can frequently make good use of the information revealed during the bidding. Thus, in the present case, West's pass of one diamond is illuminating, as is East's preemptive jump to three diamonds.

During the play, as the defenders guide each other in the defense, and their high cards and distribution are revealed, declarer gathers additional information. This accumulation of knowledge, plus his individual skill, usually enables declarer to obtain the best possible result.

When East decided to return a spade instead of a diamond, it could mean only one thing. Obviously, East feared declarer might ruff with the ten which West would be unable to over-ruff. This would therefore give away the location of the king, and declarer would not then take the finesse.

So the interpretation placed upon the spade return was that East wanted to give South a chance to finesse the heart.

But if East was trying to induce South to take a heart finesse, then it couldn't be right for South to oblige him. Hence, the finesse was refused.

Byelections And Cabinet Shifts Expected In P. Q.

QUEBEC (CP)—Premier Duplessis is to announce in the near future appointment of three new members of the 24-seat Legislative Council — provincial Upper House, it has been learned reliably.

Usually well informed sources close to the provincial administrators, rumored to be planning retirement, are to get the lifetime council posts and vacate their seats in the Legislative Assembly.

The shift, according to these sources, will be accompanied by the calling of provincial byelections—possibly three or four.

Politically, legislature circles say, the strategy will be to force new Quebec Liberal Leader Jean Lesage into an open election battle with the powerful Union Nationale party.

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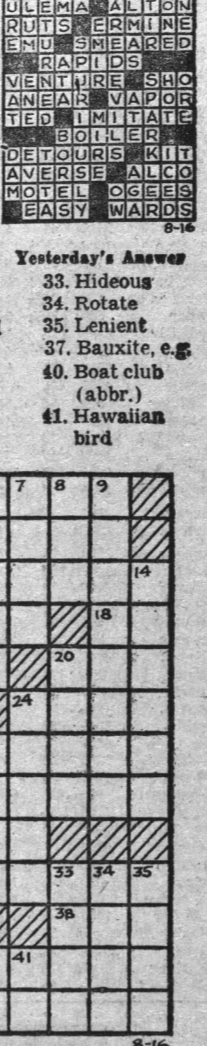
