

CURRENT NOTES.

Mr. Beaudry is again a candidate for the position of Mayor of Montreal. The appointment of the Prince of Wales as honorary Colonel of Blucher's Hussars has been gazetted. Colorado has contributed \$60,000,000 in gold and \$90,000,000 in silver to the world's stock of precious metals.

The London Times' Bombay despatch says the disproportion of casualties in the conflict between the Ryots and the Rajah's police suggests that the affair was simply a massacre. The Government has ordered an inquiry.

London is enormous, but the statement that it contains 5,000,000 people is apt to be misleading. What is called the metropolitan area, consisting of land within a radius of fifteen miles of Charing Cross, does contain very nearly that number; but estimating in this manner from the City Hall, the metropolitan area would probably include 3,000,000. To talk, therefore, of London having 5,000,000 people is delusive.

Prince Bismarck conversing with a friend a few days ago said he doubted that he would be able to attend the Reichstag this session. "Matters," he said, "progress tolerably well without me. The empire's machine generally works capitally. I am sincerely glad we are able to live without perpetual conflict. I could not endure it. The irritation of former times would kill me. I sometimes suffer the greatest agony."

Two convict prison wardens, on the 6th, brought a convict to the Treasury where he was examined. It is stated that evidence of the most important nature was obtained at the inquiry. The convict is believed to be the Friar Thomas Walsh who was arrested on a charge of treason and felony at the time of the seizure of arms in Clerkenwell, and subsequently convicted and sentenced to seven years' penal servitude.

During the examination of a policeman called as a witness in the Phoenix Park murder trial, he deposed to finding the murdered body of Mr. Bailey, an informer. The prisoners' counsel declared that the matter was wholly irrelevant. Mr. Murphy replied that he was prepared to prove that the prisoners were members of a conspiracy to which he would trace all murders in the city during the last few years, and he would prove that Bailey was connected with the discovery of the Fenian arduary in Bartizan street.

A man was found starved to death at Loughrea, County Galway, Ireland, on the 5th. At an inquiry into the case, a poor law guardian said the case was only one of many. A crowd of hungry people gathered in front of the residence, in Loughrea, of Rev. Patrick Dugan, Roman Catholic Bishop of Connaught, on Sunday. The Bishop informed them that he and the priests had distributed every shilling available and said the opening of relief works was the only resource left to relieve suffering.

CRIME.—At the annual meeting of the Society for the Suppression of Vice, held in New York, President Colgate and ex-Assistant District Attorney Beecher charged that the police received bribes from the keepers of disreputable houses. Beecher says a friend told him he had seen at headquarters a detective with a list of houses of ill-repute, gambling places, and the like, and opposite each the sum collected as hush money. He himself had been told by an ex-Police Commissioner that one captain had in that way alone made \$75,000.

Canada is far ahead of the United States in the matter of secrecy in voting. In the latter no man can throw a secret ballot if he wishes him to. The man who bribes another to vote, or who has power over him, hands him a ballot and watches to see that he puts it in. Gov. Butler, among other reforms proposed by him in Massachusetts, includes the compulsory secrecy of the ballot. The Republicans, who form the majority of the Legislature to which the Governor's suggestions are made, treating this with contempt at first, but are said to be coming around to the same view.
