Fines Totalling \$13,600 Levelled Against Asphalt Co. And Officials

SUMMERSIDE — Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald levelled \$13,600 in fines against the firm of Maritime Asphalt Products Ltd. and company officers on charges of making false or deceptive statements on income tax returns.

Earlier pleas of guilty had been entered by the company and two of its officers on nine separate charges of failure to pay taxes totalling \$102,865.50 on an income figure of \$283,787 which had not been shown on returns over an eight year period.

The two company officers who were charged were J. Arthur Clarke and Ralph G. Somers. The accused were charged with overstating salaries, failing to report incomes and stating costs. The charges were laid after two and a half years of extensive investigation by the Revenue Department authorities.

BREAKDOWN OF FINES

The fines were broken down as follows: company — charges one to four — \$100 each; charge five and six — \$500 each; charge seven — \$1,000; charge eight — \$2,000; and charge nine — \$2,000.

The fines assessed on Mr. Somers were as follows: — charge one to four — \$25 and costs or one month on each charge; charge five — \$100 and costs or one month; charge six — \$200 and costs or two months; charge seven — \$200 and costs or two months; charge eight — \$200 and costs or two months; and charge nine — \$1,000 or one year.

OTTAWA — Tenders have been called for wharf repairs at Judges point in the Tignish area. Solicitor General J. Wat. MacNaught announced here today. The tenders will be opened at 3 o'clock on May 20.

The work is estimated to cost about \$5,000. It involves removing and replacing with creosote treated timbers all untreated piles and timbers.

Construction of a new 60-foot laminated timber and concrete composite deck, 12 feet wide, will also be undertaken.
