

# Third Period Goals By Saindon Give Islanders 3-1 Win Over Sydney

SYDNEY, (CP) — A pair of third-period goals by sharp-shooting Paul Saindon gave Charlottetown Islanders a 3-1 decision over Sydney Millionaires in a Maritime Major League hockey game Tuesday night. It was Mills' third straight loss in four days, two of them at the hands of Islanders.

Charlottetown played the game without defenceman Bill LeBlanc and forward Gerry LaChance who left the club earlier in the day and returned to Mont Joli in the Quebec circuit.

Mont Joli requested the return of the two players, whom they sold to Charlottetown when it was believed the Lower St. Lawrence League, was to fold.

Coach Bucko Trainer said he had wired George Dudley, secretary, registrar of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, asking for their immediate and indefinite suspension. He said Mont Joli had accepted the purchase price from Charlottetown.

Islanders took the lead in the first period, Elwood Ritchie scoring from Orrin Carver. The 1-0 score stood until 12:17 of the second period when Lorne Pirie scored for Sydney.

Paul Saindon shot the winner in the third on a play with Bob Gray. Seven minutes later he drew goalie Norm Defelice out of the net for the insurance goal.

Charlottetown's defence of Gustavson, McLaughlin and Blackburn played well. Goalie Roger Bessette was another big factor in the Charlottetown win, handling 35 shots against 19 for Defelice at the Sydney end.

As a result of last night's organizational meeting it is very likely that winter racing will be held at the Charlottetown Driving Park this season with the first races to commence about the middle of next month.

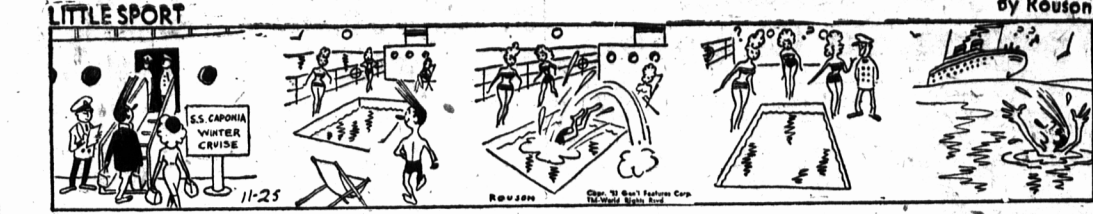

# LeChance And LeBlanc Quit Islanders; Ordered To Return By CAHA

Hockey players Gerry LaChance and Bill LeBlanc who left here yesterday morning, presumably for Mont Joli, Quebec, will be ordered to return to the Islanders by the C.A.H.A. It was learned last night from Jim MacCallum, Secretary of the Islanders Hockey Club.

George Dudley, Secretary Treasurer of the C.A.H.A. has already forwarded a wire to Mont Joli advising the two players to return to Charlottetown immediately or otherwise face indefinite suspension.

A meeting of the Islanders executive will be held tonight to decide what action the local club will take in the matter.

The two players, who came here from Mont Joli a week and a half ago, departed yesterday morning without the permission or knowledge of the Islanders Club.

Although their departure came as a total surprise to the Islanders officials it was not the first intimation that the Islanders had of the players' desire to return to Mont Joli. Last week LaChance told coach Bucko Trainer that he wished to return to Mont Joli because he could not obtain an apartment.

Neither LaChance nor his wife could speak a word of English. They were expecting their first child and were living in a hotel room. They advertised for a furnished apartment but were unable to find suitable living accommodations.

For several days coach Trainer, LaChance, LeBlanc and Roger Bessette searched for an apartment but were unsuccessful. Yesterday morning LaChance and LeBlanc left in the latter's car.

The players joined the Islanders after the Mont Joli club had folded. The Islanders paid \$500 for their services. Shortly after the two players returned here, Mont Joli re-organized and attempted to lure the players back to Quebec. The Q.A.H.A. ruled that the players belonged to Mont Joli but the C.A.H.A. over-ruled the Q.A.H.A. and gave the players to the Islanders.

Yesterday morning Jim MacCallum of the Islanders got in touch with Dudley of the C.A.H.A. as soon as he learned of the players' departure. Dudley told MacCallum that he had been in Montreal over the weekend and had told the Mont Joli club that LaChance and LeBlanc were the property of the Islanders. He also told Mont Joli not to tamper with the players.

In his last game with Islanders LaChance scored three goals to lead the local Millionaires, winning the game the players were paid for their week's work.

# Edmonton Gets Three Players

EDMONTON, (CP) — Edmonton Flyers, last-place club in the Western Hockey League, have acquired three forwards in an attempt to get back into contention. It was learned here Tuesday.

Coach Bud Poole disclosed from Toronto where he conferred with Jack Adams, general manager of the parent Detroit Red Wings, that Edmonton has acquired Neil Strain and Marcel Bonin, left wingers with major league experience, and Frank Kubasek, a centre.

Strain, 27, was bought from New York Rangers for an undisclosed sum. Bonin, 21, was acquired from Sherbrooke of the Quebec Hockey League, also a Detroit farm club, and Kubasek, a 24-year-old Alberta product formerly with Flyers was purchased from Cleveland of the American Hockey League.

# King-Chavez Bout At San Francisco Tonight

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP) — Canadian lightweight champion Lil' Arthur King of Toronto trades punches here tonight with Eddie Chavez of San Jose in a 10-round fight each hopes will lead to a chance at the world lightweight championship.

The 26-year-old King has an edge in experience over Chavez, 23-year-old California Mexican who scored a decision over world champion Jimmy Carter in a non-title affair earlier this year. Chavez will go into the ring as a mild favorite.

Comparison of fights with two common opponents in recent months indicates a close contest. Each took decisions over Armand Savoie of Montreal and Henry Davis. King won the Canadian title from Savoie. Chavez holds a nine-round decision over Savoie. The odd result is due to the fact that Chavez suffered a cut from an accidental butt on the head and received the decision because he was ahead on points when the bout was stopped.

# Glance Bay Miners In 3-3 Tie With Halifax

HALIFAX, (CP) — Glance Bay Miners, at the bottom of the Maritime Major Hockey League, came within 38 seconds of stopping league-leading Halifax Atlantics Tuesday night.

They led Halifax 3-2 with that much left of the third period, but Ross Watson scored the tying goal. After one overtime session the score was still 3-3.

Miners deserved to win. They outshot Atlantics 37 to 29. Only the good work of goalie Roy McMeekin saved Halifax. In the Glance Bay net Dick Dion also was outstanding.

Each team scored in the first period, but Miners went ahead in the second when Bobby Brown shot one from Lumley and Leyte. They stayed there until Watson's last-minute evened.

# Traffon Slams Door On All Eavesdroppers

AURORA, Ont. (CP) — George Traffon, pugnacious, fiery-tongued coach of Winnipeg Blue Bombers, herded his team into training quarters here Tuesday and promptly slammed the door on eavesdroppers.

Traffon and his Bombers landed at Toronto's Malton airport Tuesday afternoon in their gaily-decorated, chartered "Blue Bomber Special" plane and left at once for this town 24 miles north of Toronto.

"Workouts will be closed to everyone, including the press," Traffon told Toronto sports writers and photographers at the airport.

Asked how he planned to work out his team for Saturday's Grey Cup final against Hamilton Tiger-Cats, Traffon said: "Well, I'm not going to run them to death Thursday and Friday."

# Expect 15 Millions To Watch Or Hear Grey Cup Game

TORONTO, (CP) — Nearly one-third of Canada's population of nearly 15,000,000 will watch or listen to the Grey Cup game on Saturday.

For one Grey Cup day—even in the Maritimes which in the last few years has begun to take an interest in Upper Canada football madness—people remain glued to their radio and television sets.

About 27,000 lucky fans will be inVarsity Stadium itself Saturday to see Hamilton Tiger-Cats and Winnipeg Blue Bombers kick off at 1 p.m. EST in the country's greatest grid classic.

More than 80 Canadian and American sports writers will overflow the Stadium's elaborate press box. The Canadian Press, Canada's co-operative news-gathering agency, will have a six-man team covering the game.

Thousands of Canadian servicemen in England and Germany will listen to play-by-play descriptions of the game by short-wave radio. Recordings of the broadcast will be flown to the Far East in the biggest radio and television coverage of any sports event in the country's history.

A potential audience of 5,500,000 will receive on-the-spot broadcasts from 70 radio stations covering all provinces except Newfoundland. The CBC-TV network will link Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal.

A kinescope of the televised spectacle will be rushed to CPFL London, Ont., which formally opens its stadium Saturday, and to CKSO in Sudbury, which has had television for only a few weeks.

The radio coverage will be on the largest network ever to carry a Canadian sports event. Sixty-four stations carried last year's Grey Cup.

The radio account will be beamed into homes of football fans from Sydney, N.S., to Nanaimo, B.C. and from Pelee Island, Ont. Canada's most southern point, to Dawson Creek, B.C. in the far north.

Eight radio stations will carry the game in British Columbia. The others: Alberta 7; Saskatchewan 7; Manitoba 4; Ontario 32; Quebec 3; Nova Scotia 4; New Brunswick 4; Prince Edward Island 1.

Persons in the Maritimes will start listening at 1:45 p.m. AST. In the television field, the game will be carried on CBT Toronto, CBOT Ottawa and CBFT Montreal.

NEW YORK, (CP) — The World-Telegram said Tuesday it has learned that Harry (Cookie) Lavagetto, a Brooklyn Dodger coach last season, will be the new manager of Montreal Royals, the Dodgers' International League farm club.

Lavagetto, 38, was the Dodger third-baseman in 1947, when his two-run double in the ninth inning ruled Bill Bevens' bid for a world series no-hitter and gave Brooklyn a 2-1 victory over New York Yankees.

He will succeed Wally Alston as Montreal manager following Alston's appointment to manage the Dodgers, the newspaper says.

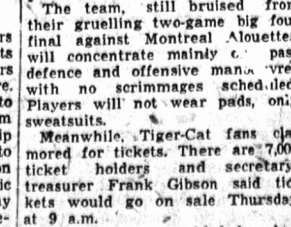

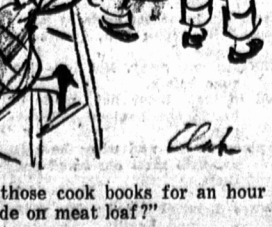

# Hungary vs. England In Soccer Match Today

LONDON, (CP) — Eleven athletic citizens of the Hungarian Democratic People's Republic will attempt today on the green sward of Wembley Stadium to end a 60-year English soccer record.

The stakes are high and the contrasts marked in what has been billed as the classic match of the half-century.

Victory for Hungary means an unbeaten string of 27 games and continued soccer pre-eminence dating from her Olympic victory at Helsinki last year. Her players, who receive no salaries, will be in line for decorations like "worthy sportsman of the people's republic" if England triumphs, she remains undefeated at home by a foreign team. Her players get £50 win or lose.

Expect Victory — stocky, quiet, polite and obvious in excellent condition — four English reporters that they expect to win and that Stanley Matthews, England's 39-year-old ball juggler, is the only man they are afraid of. "They won't go to jail," Gustav Sebes, Hungarian vice-minister of sport, told reporters when asked what happens if Hungary loses. He smiled as he said it.

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
