INFAMOUS WORK.

We learn that the Government has
about forty men engaged at a point called
Skinner's Pond in the vicinity of Tigeish,
digging a hole in the sand bank of the
shore, and holding out the inducement to
the people of that locality that a harbor
will be built at that place. No sum has
ever been placed in the estimates for a
work of this kind, and therefore, there is
no authorization of the expenditure now
going on. The place has several times been
surveyed by the engineers of the depart-
ment and their reports have been invari-
ably unfavorable to any such project. The
present resident engineer who looked over
the ground in 1895 and in 1897 gave it as
his opinion that the thing was not feasi-
ble, and the late Mr. Perry dropped the
matter. Now, however, on the eve of an
election, a disreputable government wants
votes for an equally disreputable
candidate—and, without scruple,
the money is fished from the treasury.
The same unwarranted expenditures pre-
valent in all the Federal and Local govern-
ments. Men are engaged on the Railway
pulling up grass already dead. The
road machines are engaged in ruining the
highways for fall traffic, and additional
horses are required to haul the load of
men perched on each machine.

"Whom the gods wish to destroy they
first make mad," and we shall be much
surprised if the independent people of this
Province, in conjunction with the other
provinces, do not rise in their wrath and
mete out condign punishment on the cor-
rupt combination that rules our fair
Dominion.

Elections, you require to guard your
country today as much as before. You
require to be watchful of your interests.
The fundamental principle of British
government is seriously threatened when
your money is needlessly spent without
the warrant or authority of the people's
representatives,—and a farce is made of
constitutional government.

Independent yeomenry of P. E. Island,

THE PATRIOTIC MONUMENT.

At a representative meeting of citizens,
held yesterday afternoon, Mr. Justice
Fitzgerald in the chair, it was, after full
discussion, and upon motion of Council-
or Lyons, seconded by Mr Horace Hasz-
ard,—

Resolved, That a committee of twelve
citizens be appointed to procure designs
and ascertain cost of a suitable monument
to commemorate the event and do honor
to the memory of the heroes who repre-
sented the province on the battle-fields of
South Africa. The committee to report
to a meeting to be called later.

The following committee was subse-
quently appointed: Premier Farquhar-
son, Mayor of the City, Lt.-Col Moore, C
C Gardner, Percy Pope, James Byrne, L
L Beer, Judge Fitzgerald, J E B Mc-
Creedy, L W Watson, P Blake, Senator
Ferguson.

The passage of this resolution has placed
the matter upon the proper footing.
When the people have obtained a definite
idea concerning the monument and are as-
sured that their money will be ap-
plied to that object, they will subscribe
promptly and liberally.

The question now is what form shall
the monument take? A substantial arch at
the southern entrance to Queen Square
Gardens with fountains, at which the
thirsty passers by may be refreshed, suit-
ably ornamented and inscribed, is the only
definite proposition that we have yet
heard made. Certainly this would be
effective.

We have no doubt that a majority of
the committee will give this important
matter their early and careful attention

—The Montreal Star points out that
"There is more revenue because the peo-
ple are paying higher prices for every-

under Conservative rule, but the prices
being much higher under the ad valorem
system the duties collected are greater."
