## TOO MANY MAYORS

CALGARY, Aug. 13 (CP)—Back in 1885 Calgary was only a cluster of log cabins, but the town had two mayors for a time. David G. Hackney, pioneer merchant, told a gathering of Alberta old-timers here.

"The old crowd hung on to the books and city record and refused to give up the Town Hall," Hackney recalled. Finally an appeal was made to Ottawa and the government sent a man named Jeremiah Travis to settle the quarrel and to become first stipendiary magistrate in the district.

Judge Travis called for a vote of councillors which favored the new administration. He thereupon persuaded Murdoch to relinquish office.

## "ALL WOOL" HOSIERY MUST BE JUST THAT IN FUTURE

When you buy a pair of woollen hosiery next year stamped "all wool" you can rest assured you will get just that—not 10 to 50 per cent cotton. In fact, such labels on all kinds of hosiery will mean exactly what they say.

History-making rules setting up standards for the marking of hosiery were announced Thursday by Trade Minister Euler, exercising for the first time the power vested in the Dominion Trade and Industry Commission to establish commodity standards.

The regulations become effective next Feb. 1 as far as manufacturers and importers are concerned and on Feb. 1, 1941, as far as jobbers, wholesalers and retailers are concerned to give ample opportunity to get rid of stock. The regulations are not compulsory but if any marking is placed on hosiery, it must be in accord with these rules.

"Cotton," for example, will mean "the product made from the fibrous material of the cotton plant." Similarly, "wool" means the "product made from the fibrous material of the fleece of a sheep or lamb, angora goat, camel or like natural animal fibre."

"Rayon" is defined as "the textile fibre of yara produced chemically from cellulose or with a cellulose base" and "silk" means "natural silk" the product from the cocoon of the silk worm.

When a combination of two or more textile fibres is used, all must be indicated, providing they each amount to more than five per cent.

Descriptive terms such as botany, lisle, mercerized, crepe, chiffon must be used only in combination with the description of the fibre; for example, botany wool, lisle cotton, mercerized rayon, crepe silk, chiffon.

Trade names or brands also may not suggest a fibre content except in combination with the word or words authorized for describing the actual fibre content.

The material content of cloths, stripes or other decorations may not be described on the hosiery except where it is clearly identified with the cloth, stripe or decoration. For example, "silk cloth" or "rayon stripes" it must be in one line and of one type.

The worst offences in misleading descriptions in the past, it is said, have been in woollen hosiery where jobbers sometimes offered to buy several thousand pairs of hose from a manufacturer if he agreed to make them of a substantial part of cotton and marketed them "all wool." The worst offenders went as high as 50 per cent cotton in rayon and silk hosiery because most women were able to tell the difference.

## DIES FROM INJURIES WHEN YOU WEAN THE BABY

"Baby's no trouble at all," boasted a young mother proudly to me the other day. (writes a nurse.) "She takes her feeds without any fuss, loves her bath, and we don't hear a sound from her all night."

"It's all very well to talk now," I said. "She's only three months old, but you wait until she's three months older."

"There's no reason why all babies shouldn't be perfect angels for the first five months if their day by day routine is carried out and they are normally healthy."

"It's when you come to wean them that you'll face your first big problem, if you don't start Baby off in the right way, all your good work of the past will be quickly undone, and she may have a bad setback."

As I told my young friend, I believe in gradual weaning straight on to cup and spoon feeding, and mothers will have no lasting trouble with the process provided that they are patient.

Baby is not likely to take to the change without a murmur. She will probably show definite disapproval at first, but, after all you as mother are in charge and perseverance on your part will win the day.

If Baby registers too much disapproval, wrap her firmly in a clean towel so that the small arms cannot be waved about nor the spoon knocked out of your hand, and go on patiently with the feeding using a shallow-bowled spoon with rounded edges.

Pay no heed if she spits back food at first; that is bound to happen until Baby gets accustomed to new tastes and to the feel of the spoon, so carry on until she finally gives in gracefully. This should only take a few days.

## Par Takes A Beating With Sarazen In Front

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 11—Golfers who couldn't hold a candle to par in the first round tore that old gentleman limb from limb today as Gene Sarazen blazed his way to a two-stroke lead in the \$10,000 Dapper Dan open golf tournament. A gallery of nearly 2,000 cheered the Connecticut farmer as he burned up the course with a 66, four under par and two strokes better than the course record set up two years ago by Ray Manrum of Pittsburgh. His 36-hole total was 137.

As the maggot is between the upper and lower leaf surfaces, you cannot reach it by spraying and you will have to go over the plants with finger and thumb treatment.

Don't wait for this; spray the plants now and every week with a nicotine insecticide, being careful to wet the undersides of each leaf with the spray.

## AUSTRALIA BACK OF BRITAIN

MELBOURNE, Australia, Aug. 8—Prime Minister Robert Menzies said tonight that "if Britain is involved in an European war owing to the pursuit of her present policy Australia will make common cause with her."

The Prime Minister referred to a statement published last Thursday in the National Zeitung of Essen, newspaper of Field Marshal Hermann Goering, to the effect that almost the entire Empire would go to Britain's aid in event of war.

(The National Zeitung asserted that Australia would make "some gesture on behalf of London" but claimed that if the conflict extended to the Pacific she will try to keep out of the line of fire. Whether she can do so, however, depends not on Australia or England but on the attitude of certain opponents.)

## PLAN ADDITION TO BOYS' TOWN

WINNIPEG, Aug. 13 (CP)—Enlarging Boys' Town, at Omaha, Nebraska, will enable 300 more abandoned youths to enter the famous home for boys, Father G. L. Demers, assistant to Father Flanagan, who started the colony in 1917, said during a visit here.

The home for "abandoned, neglected and some wayward boys" now houses 200, of which only 10 per cent are problem boys, he said. Two lads from Saskatchewan are in the "town" and 27 states of the union are represented. There are 19 different nationalities and more than 2,800 boys have lived in the place.

Five buildings grade the lawns and there are spacious playgrounds. The football squad was undefeated in five seasons and the basketball team has been invited to play in Honolulu.

## CARE OF CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Summer is a critical time for chrysanthemums. They must be fed well or the plants will not be fit to carry the large blooms we want from them in late autumn.

Just now the leaf-miners are busy. These are flies that attack chrysanthemums and many other garden plants. They are quite small—only one-tenth of an inch in length—and you do not notice them flying from leaf to leaf laying their eggs on the undersides of the leaves.

What you will notice, perhaps, in a few weeks' time, is that your leaves are tunnelled through and through by the small maggot that
