### Pineapple Cheese Cake Classic No-Bake Beauty

Today's variation of the classic cheese cake is wonderfully flavored, as well as beautifully decorated with canned pineapple. Delightful for the Easter dinner dessert, it can be served at a dessert and coffee party during Easter Week. Some of the pineapple syrup is used in the creamy cottage cheese custard filling. The pineapple slices are placed around the pan in a lacy pattern before the filling is poured in.

Measurements level Pineapple Cheese Cake

- 1 c. fine graham cracker crumbs
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 1/4 c. room-soft butter or margarine
- 1 (1 lb. 4 1/2 oz.) can pineapple slices
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. fine-grated lemon rind
- 2 tsp. lemon juice

1 c. creamed cottage cheese

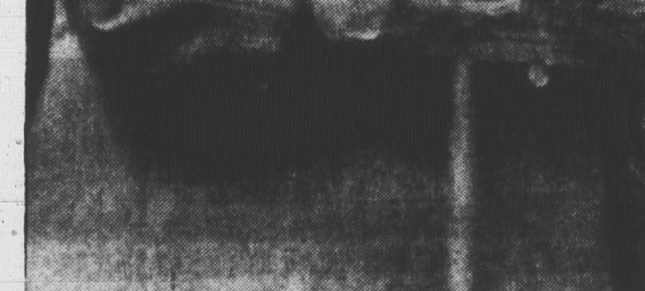
1 c. heavy whipping cream

Thoroughly mix graham cracker crumbs, sugar and butter. (Reserve 1/2 c. of crumbs for top of cake.) Firmly press the rest onto bottom of deep 9" cake pan equipped with removable bottom.

1/2 c. syrup. Stand pineapple slices around sides of pan.

Stir gelatin into reserved syrup to soften. Separate eggs. Beat yolks until frothy and stir in milk, sugar and salt. Cook-stir over hot water about 3 min. Add lemon rind, softened gelatin and lemon juice; stir until gelatin dissolves. Refrigerate until consistency of unbeaten egg-white.

Press cottage cheese through a sieve and stir into gelatin. Refrigerate 30 min., stirring twice, or until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from spoon. Beat egg whites stiff; whip cream; fold egg whites and cream into gelatin mixture. Pour mixture into prepared

Mesdames:—When we write about broiler meals as of today, we mean meals composed of foods that are almost all prepared on a broiler; it should always be preheated (heated in advance of use).

All gas, and electric ranges are equipped with broilers. In addition, there are many adequate separate electric broilers (or grills) that may be used. The food to be broiled is placed on the wire rack and set to cook beneath the direct flame or heat of the preheated boiler.

In broiling foods for an entire meal, start first the food that takes longest to cook. All firm vegetables and fruits that can be sliced or halved, may also be broiled in a broiler preheated for 10 min.

DEAR F. B.: Dr. Margaret Ribble's compassionate study, "The Rights of Infants" (Columbia University Press), recently updated in a new edition, stated as long ago as the 1940's that it is virtually impossible for a woman to be a successful mother without the leadership help and backing of a capable devoted on-the-job husband and father.

Inasmuch as the infant assimilates his basic sense of security (or lack of it) from the mother primarily, it follows that the mother, in order to transmit security, must herself be secure in the mother role. And this, in the human scene, requires a loyal, competent helpline in the deal, to give top priority to her own and the infant's security needs.

The fundamentally masculine helpline will act with innate authority and instinctive know-how to protect wife and child from all preventable anxieties in the early years of their life-sharing history.

**Milk's a Must**  
Top any snack off with a cool refreshing glass of milk and it tastes much better. Milk just naturally brings out the best in food. Also introduces the family to good nutrition without their ever suspecting it!

**Great With Cake**  
Any cake fans in the house? Try this broiled topping for them next time you whip up a mix. Cut 15 large marshmallows in half and arrange over the top of an 8-inch square cake, hot from the oven. Spread with a mixture of 1/2 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup soft butter. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup chopped peanuts and broil a few minutes, until the marshmallows are melted.

**Tops With Cheese**

For the topping, combine 1 beaten egg, 1 tablespoon milk and 1/2 cup shredded Canadian cheddar cheese. Pour over biscuits, sprinkle with nutmeg and bake in a 450° F oven until golden, about 15 minutes. Perfect with milk and a little orange marmalade!

**Charm the Children**  
Brighten a rainy day for the children with mugs of milk and gay plain doughnuts. Start with plain cake doughnuts and encrusted with two colors of icing to give a playful effect. . . . quick and easy!

**At Informal Parties**  
Set out tall glasses of cold milk for the teenagers along with a Giant Hot Dog Loaf . . . they'll do the rest! Cut a French loaf into 1/2-inch thick slices and make into sandwiches, filling with a mixture of 2 cups shredded Canadian cheddar cheese, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, a dash of Worcestershire sauce and a little dry mustard. Put sandwiches together to form a loaf again on a long piece of foil; gather foil up around the base to hold the "loaf" together. Cut wieners in half lengthwise and slip one into each sandwich. Bake on a cookie sheet in a 375° F oven 20 to 25 minutes.
