Three generations of the Marshall family of Marshall Foodshops donated the half-ton eight foot high birthday cake to Dr. Harold John Ockenga, minister of Park Street Church, and his congregation for their 150th anniversary celebration.

The Marshall's making the presentation were: Mr. W. Herbert Marshall, president; son Roger Marshall, vice-president; son Damon Marshall and grandson, Jamie Marshall.

The scale model of the famous colonial structure on historic "Brimstone Corner" was made of 600 eggs, 400 pounds of fruit and one hundred pounds of icing. New Stamp Commemorates 3rd Visit Of Royal Couple

The Honourable William Hamilton, Postmaster General, today announced the design of a new postage stamp to be issued in honour of the visit of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip to Canada, this year. The commemorative stamp will be placed on sale to the public on June 18, the day on which the Royal Couple will arrive at the airport at Torbay, Newfoundland.

The design on the stamp includes a likeness of Her Majesty taken from the well-known painting by Pietro Annigoni, which was commissioned in 1954 by The Worshipful Company of Fishmongers and which now hangs in their Hall near London Bridge. The dark red stamp is of the five-cent denomination, measures one inch wide and one and one-half inches high, and is printed in vertical format in panes of fifty stamps each.

THIRD VISIT
The Postmaster General pointed out that this is the third occasion on which the issue of commemorative stamps has marked the visit to Canada of a reigning sovereign. Three special stamps were issued in 1939 at the time of the Royal Visit of the late King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother. In 1957 when Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip arrived in this country for the first time after her coronation, the postal tribute was a five-cent stamp portraying the profiles of the Royal Couple taken from a photograph by Karsh of Ottawa.

The outstanding event of the Royal Tour this year will be the official opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway. Tentative plans indicate that the visit will be an historic occasion as many cities

and towns will welcome a reigning monarch for the first time. All the provinces, as well as Yukon and the Northwest Territories, are included in the coast-to-coast itinerary of the Royal Couple.

THE ANNIGONI PORTRAIT
Authority to use the painting by Pietro Annigoni in the production of this stamp was obtained from the London "Times" which holds the world copyright for the owners. Two years ago the plate was engraved and it was held for use when a suitable occasion would arise. Keen-eyed observers will see that the year of the engraving—"1897"—appears in minute characters in the lower left-hand corner of the stamp. The numerals are inconspicuous and are not an integral part of the main design.

In the original painting, the Queen, wearing the blue velvet mantle, collar and Star of the Order of the Garter, stands in front of a landscape near Windsor Castle. Only the upper portion of the painting is reproduced in the stamp.

The Most Noble Order of the Garter is England's oldest order of chivalry and was founded more than six hundred years ago at Windsor Castle. "For the adorning and encouraging of military virtue with honours, rewards and glory".

The artist, Annigoni, was born in Milan, Italy, in 1910, and has exhibited his paintings in many European cities and permanent collections of his work are to be found in galleries of Florence and Milan. He was also commissioned by the Company of Fishmongers to produce a matching portrait of Prince Philip who is a member of the Court of Assistants of the Company.
