## Stars Take Over Second Place In Standing By 7-2 Victory Over The Anchors

Chalking up their second straight City Baseball League victory Eastern Stars last night forged into second place in the standings as they batted their way to a 7-2 victory over the Anchors in a game that was called at the end of the sixth inning, with darkness fast creeping on.

## Montana And Hughes Stage Slugfest After The Former Scores Win Over Kasaboski

Larry "Babe" Kasaboski lost his first match in three local starts here last night, being thrown by tough, rugged "Bull" Montana in the main event of the wrestling show staged at the Sporting Club but the defeat came only after the fans had seen one of the most exciting and rugged matches staged here.

And as an aftermath to it all Referee "Cowboy" Len Hughes became entangled with the apparently unswayed victor who after being awarded the deciding fall continued to hand out punishment to his beaten adversary with kicks. Hughes, seeking to protect Kasaboski, was stretched flat by a well-directed punch by Montana; coming back on his feet the pair started an action which at one time threatened to get beyond control as the fans stormed the ringside, but it all wound up with Hughes again being tossed to the floor after Montana, refusing to get into the ring and wrestle Hughes in an "everything goes" battle rushed Hughes from behind and again tossed him off the ring apron.

It was an exciting nerve tingling finish to a card that saw the grapplers display more action than in any previous matches here. The Hughes-Montana flurry stole the spotlight from the main event but the main go itself was lacking in nothing.

Paying scant attention to the rules not a minute after the match started the pair slugged, kicked, and even bit in an endeavour to get the upper hand. Montana, a short, thicket powerful wrestler with a deadly punch had the upper hand for the first few minutes of the match but Kasaboski, a 99 percent favorite with the fans soon took command and crawling back into the ring after being hurled out by his opponent, caught Montana with a series of flying tackles before slamming on a body press to take the first fall after 13 minutes and 50 seconds of wrestling.

Enraged by losing the fall Montana came back into the ring in an ugly mood for the second fall. Immediately the fists began to fly but whenever Kasaboski threatened to return a dose of the same medicine Montana would take to the ropes for safety. ## Burton Takes Halfway Lead In British Open; Bulla Only U. S. Hope

(By DREW MIDDLETON Associated Press Staff Writer) ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 6.—(AP)—Richard Burton, seasoned son of an English golfing family, tacked a decisive 72 on to his previous 70 to snatch the halfway lead in the British Open Golf Championship today amid soaring hopes that the title will stay at home.

An easy-going shotmaker from the Argentine, Martin Pose, stood in second place a stroke behind the pacemaker, after posting scores of 71-72. But a battalion of homebreds was close on his heels as the field was thinned for the final session against St. Andrews exacting old course.

Only Jovial Johnny Bulla, Chicago professional, remained to carry the United States bid.

### Little Off Form

Lawson Little of New Hampshire tossed away his slight chance of entering tomorrow's final 36 holes with 2-1-2 hours of shoddy play in which he took an 80. This lamentable round gave him 159 for the first 36 holes—far above the strike minimum of 150 which qualified 34 golfers, including such Empire greats as Henry Cotton, Bobby Locke, Jim Bruen and defending champion Reggie Whitcombe for tomorrow's final two rounds.

Bulla added a neat two-under par 71 to his previous 77 for 148 to slide in two strokes under the qualifying minimum.

Jack Fallon, a virtual unknown, was third with 144 after a round of 73, while half a dozen other Britons were bracketed at 145. They were Locke, the young South African who blew up on the 14th and 17th, just when the lead appeared in sight, and took a 75. Alf Perry, champion in 1935; Jim Brussen, a seasoned pro; Dave Rees, a little Welshman; Syd Easterbrooke, veteran internationalist, and W. Shankland.

### Face Leaders

A stroke back of this set, and four off Burton's pace was a quarter topped by Henry Cotton, winner of this crown in 1934 and '37, and Whitcombe, who took it a year ago. Cotton saw his place as Britain's "ideal golfer" usurped by Burton today when he took a seven on the same 17th that caused Luckie's downfall.

Further back in the field were Bruen, the 19-year-old Irish amateur who played conventionally good golf for two-over par 75 and 147 total, and James Adams, a Scotch native, with the same aggregate. Back of them came Bulla, the veteran Len Crawley and Percy Allis at 148; Robert Smyth, former California now of London at 149, and Alex Kyle, amateur tilts, just under the wire at 150.

## Castilloux Scores Win Over Rodak

TORONTO, July 6.—(CP)—Rugged Dave Castilloux of Montreal, Canadian Featherweight Champion, punched his way a little closer to a crack at the world title by scoring a unanimous 10-round decision over Leo Rodak of Chicago tonight at Maple Leaf Gardens. The Canadian weighed 129 1/4 and Rodak 130 1/2.

The grim Montrealer piled up a long lead on points in the early rounds by poking his left repeatedly into Rodak's face. It wasn't until the late minutes that Rodak, rated by the National Boxing Association No. 1 contender for Joey Archibald's world crown, started to carry the fight.

Then Rodak was well behind and Castilloux was coasting in. The Chicagoan whipped over his long left but Castilloux tied him up quickly and Rodak's body punches did little damage.

Trailing the leader by nine strokes came Mrs. L. Baker of Yarmouth, the former "Babs" Creighton. She had a one-stroke margin on Mrs. Connor of Halifax Ashburn. The rest of the field failed to break 100.

Playing under a blazing hot sun, Miss Howard took the lead at the first hole with an eagle that gave her a three-stroke lead. Near the end of the 18 holes, Miss Trides narrowed it down to one.
