Athletics Get Players From Yanks In Cash Deal

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Kansas City Athletics Wednesday bought pitchers Ewell Blackwell and Tommy Gorman and first baseman Dick Kryhoski from New York Yankees in a straight cash deal.

The purchase price was announced as "in excess of \$50,000." Blackwell, once one of the finest righthanded pitchers in the game with Cincinnati, was on the Yankee voluntarily retired list last year, suffering from a sore arm.

Gorman appeared in 11 games with the Yanks last year after being brought up from the then Kansas City Blues. His worst record was 3-2 and his earned run average 3.88. He is a righthander.

Kryhoski, a veteran lefthanded first baseman, served several years in the Yankee organization before being traded to Detroit. He returned to the Yankees in a winter deal from Baltimore Orioles.
