MANITOBA ELECTIONS.

The Conservative leader in Manitoba, Mr. Hugh John Macdonald, is by no means disheartened by the heavy odds against him. On the contrary he is confident of the success of his party. To a Mail and Empire reporter a few days ago he said:

"I think that the organization is the finest that we have ever had in the Dominion of Canada. There are forty constituencies, and these are organized by townships. Now, a township is six miles by six and by establishing half a dozen men at different points in each township to assist in organization, we have been able to keep in perfect touch with the state of public opinion. The Conservatives have been wonderfully successful in the very important work of supervising the voters' list. Everywhere that I have gone I have received the most encouraging reports. Scores of electors who have been known in years past as strong reformers have declared their intention of voting Conservative at the coming election. Then a principal part of our duty has been that of winning back Conservatives who, since the defeat of Premier Norquay, have parted from us on local issues, such as disallowance and the school question. In this we have been very successful.

"A most reassuring fact to me is the absolute confidence of Conservative workers in every constituency that they are going to carry their own ridings. Of course we can hardly hope for such a victory, but the fact is significant. On the other hand, they are all working. We are in no danger from over-confidence."

What the Conservatives of Manitoba have most to fear is Liberal tampering with the ballot boxes. Mr. Macdonald expects that the election will be held in November.

THE ALASKA BOUNDARY.

It is an interesting fact that two P. E. Islanders have now in hand the Canadian case in respect to the Alaskan boundary. Sir Louis Davies and Mr. Joseph Pope are on their way to England. Concerning their mission the Toronto Globe has the following despatch from Ottawa:

"Statements that Mr. Reginald Tower, British Charge d'Affaires at Washington, and secretary Hay have arrived at an agreement regarding a tentative settlement of the Alaskan boundary difficulty may be authentic, but the Canadian Government has no information regarding the alleged agreement. Sir Louis Davies and Mr. Joseph Pope, Under Secretary of State, are now on their way to London to lay the Canadian case before Lord Salisbury. Even if Mr. Tower and Col. Hay have come to an understanding there need be no fear that Lord Salisbury by acting precipitately will render Sir Louis and Mr. Pope's mission fruitless. How he will be impressed with the Canadian case is another matter. Although Canada's claim is so strong as to admit of no dispute between Canadian politicians, and, although eminent English publicists hold that we are in the right, Downing street seems to have, to speak mildly, a very open mind on the subject. Sir Louis Davies is an undoubted authority on the Alaskan question, and Mr. Pope, who has intimate knowledge of it, has prepared an exhaustive memorandum on the subject. Lord Salisbury has been apprised of the departure of the Canadians for London, and until they shall have conferred with the British Premier and Mr. Chamberlain there need be no reliance placed on either London or Washington reports to the effect that any settlement has been consummated."

—It is stated that even now, some of the latter-day corruptionists, (who call themselves Liberals) are working in the electoral districts south of the Hillsborough,—well supplied with whiskey.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—There has been an unexpected change of Government in New South Wales, Mr. Reid having been succeeded in the Premiership by Mr. J. W. Lyne. The Labour party in the colony has secured the balance of power.

—We draw attention to the legal card of Mr. W. F. Harrison Carvell, published in another column of THE EXAMINER. For some time after his admission as an attorney-at-law, Mr. Carvell continued with the law firm of Messrs M. and D. C. McLeod, in whose office he had been a student. He has now opened an office on his own account in the Bank of Nova Scotia building here. Mr. Carvell is a graduate of King's College University, Nova Scotia. We wish him success in his chosen profession.

—A writer in Scribner's for September remarks, "The more I have seen of the half bloods of Canada, the more I have come to admire them. They are of fearless stock, and have inherited many good traits from both races. They regard with amusement and pity their half brothers, the full-blood Algonquians of the remote forest, but they understand the arts of woodlore which make life more than endurable there. They have French, English, Scotch, and Scandinavian family names, and anyone who thinks they lead an uncomfortable life is very much mistaken."

Activity in England.

LONDON, September 11.—The troops going to South Africa as the result of the decision of Friday's Cabinet Council to send ten thousand soldiers there, will proceed to Natal, bringing the total number of men in that colony up to 16,000. Reinforcements numbering 5,000 men will be drawn from India.

The Northumberland Fusiliers will embark next Saturday for Cape Colony, leaving for Southampton. The first Royal Sussex Regiment has been ordered to be ready to embark within three days. An infantry brigade with a division of field artillery, from Aldershot, with eighteen guns has been ordered to leave for the Cape in ten days.

It is understood that General Sir Redvers Buller will sail for Capetown next Saturday. The Indian authorities are chartering steamships to transport troops to South Africa as rapidly as possible.
