Back For Short Stint

Hello again. Our colleague Gus Callaghan mentioned in his going-away column yesterday morning that during our stint on Sports Front we were probably his on Toronto Maple Leafs. But we have decided not, at least not in our first column in 1963. We were happy to see Chicago Black Hawks defeat the Leafs 3-1 Wednesday night in Toronto to regain possession of the league lead but today we will chat about another NHL team, or rather a former one, Jacques Plante.

Plante, the amazing and agile Hab goaltender, appears well on his way to an unprecedented seventh NHL MVP trophy on his way to a shabby start.

After 26 games between the pipes, the masked marvel is showing an amazing 18 saves in 40 shutouts in his credit. Cesare Maniago and Ernie Wakely saved netminding duties while Plante was out, and the Canadiens' goalie average comes to 2.27 in 37 games.

Although he captured the Vezina trophy an award donated by Montreal Canadiens in 1926 in memory of the great Georges Vezina, a seasonal goalie who collapsed during an NHL game on November 29, 1925 and died a few months later, six times Plante was over-looked on several occasions.

While Doug Harvey was a Montreal goalie always argued, Plante's critics always argued that the powerful Hab's defense made Plante look good and that Harvey should be the goalie. Plante is able to look after the great net while Harvey is always argued for New York along with goaltender Bill Durnan. Plante is to shine in the Montreal cage.

Last year, capturing both the Vezina trophy and the Hart trophy, Plante was named the best player while gaining a berth on the All-Star team.

Only one other goalie has won the Vezina as many times as Plante since it came into being in 1926 and that feat was by Maurice Richard, who has won the award 15 times in 35 years, triple that of any other team in the major circuit.

Boston Goalie Busiest

EVERYONE has been marveling at the amount of work that Boston goalie Gump Worsley has had in his year but he still isn't the busiest goalie in the league. Edward Johnson, the Boston netminder who shares cap duties with pudgy Bob Terrisoli, holds a record for most goals against him.

Johnson averages 38.2 shots a game and Worsley averages 87.7. Those figures are considerably higher than the league average of 21.3.

One scribble commenting on the amount of work these two goalies have to handle says: "That's enough to give a man the shakes. Whatever they do in Boston and New York, it isn't enough. Johnson and Worsley should be entitled to a share in the remuneration commensurate with the cigar store Indians in front of their disguised as defencemen."

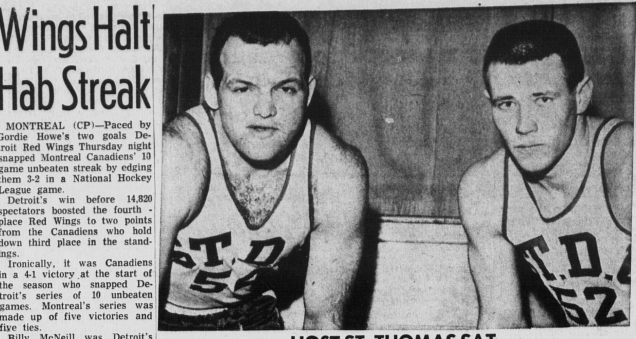

Burns Triggers Winner As Bruins Nip Hawks 5-4

BOSTON (AP)—A lunging 25-foot shot by Charlie Burns enabled Boston Bruins to defeat Chicago Blackhawks 5-4 in an intercollegiate game at SDU gym Saturday night.

Deenceman Eddie Westfall's diagonal pass across the ice sent Burns rushing down the left boards from where his shot just caught the far corner at 12:47 of the third period.

That was the winner in a wild first - slinging contest in which the Bruins outbatted the Hawks. The game marked the first time in eight meetings that the Bruins had beaten the Black Hawks.

CHP AVALU AT LEADS
Boston twice had held two-goal leads but Chicago kept chipping away and Wayne Hillman's second major league goal brought the visitors to a 4-4 deadlock less than 90 seconds before Burns settled the issue.

Little Guy Gendron had been on the first three Boston scores, assisting Tommy Williams on his 15th goal to open scoring and then tallying twice himself.

Brown Says Outing Came As 'Shock'

CLEVELAND (CP)—Paul Brown, ousted as general manager and coach from the football team he founded 17 years ago, said Thursday the move came as a shock.

Brown, who gave his name to Cleveland Browns of the National Football League, said in an interview that club President Arthur B. Modell had the right to make the move "legally," but he added:

"This came as a surprise and a shock, as you would understand."

Brown, 54, year-old grandson of a 19th-century entrepreneur who had signed an eight-year contract two years ago, was ousted Wednesday with a simple but stunning announcement by Modell which said Brown would "remain as vice-president... and will assume other duties."

Brown said his new duties with the club were still to be defined. But he would not include coaching and "my life is coaching—this has been my life, next to my family."

He said he would not attend NFL meetings at the end of this month in Florida. He said Modell expected to have his new coach on hand there.

"Asked about the differences with the owner-president that have been changed, Brown mentioned no specific incidents, but said the break came because Modell "wanted to take a more active part in the actual team aspects formerly assigned to me."

Brown's comments heightened speculation that he would not serve out his contract with the club he founded in 1946 but seek a coaching job elsewhere.
