Dear Mary Haworth: As modern mothers, we are so busy, I thank you for your sympathetic attitude and advice to the frustrated young mother of two babies.

One hears so much about spoiled children these days, comparing us unfavorably to our pioneer ancestors. We get the feeling nowadays that many of us are just hopelessly lazy or inadequate.

But whatever reason we can't deny that we get tired and tense, until at times we feel our nerves explode in all directions.

We find ourselves screaming at our hapless children, if a feeling horribly depressed because we're called to be the calm, firm, loving consistent parents the child-rearing articles say we should be.

And to the distraught young mother may I say: It does get easier. And sooner than you think.

For me and for lots of mothers (not all) the change from one spoiled child to two is a relief in terms of mental strain. Having two helpless little people to care for, without the helping attention at the same time, is something I can't even begin to describe.

By the time my third son was born I was amazed how smoothly everything went. My first was a perfect joy and I learned that three didn't bother me.

Now my friends are broadening again and there is time for the young children. I highly recommend a baby-sitting cooperative club such as we have in our neighborhood.

In exchange for "sitting" for the children of other members you may have your own children cared for by reliable mothers who also have other children in free hours in the daytime.
