TELEGRAPHIC

LONDON, Sept. 20.
George Parkes Bidder, one of the promoters of the electric telegraph in England, is dead.

It is stated that the Vatican has determined to send an Apostolic delegate as *charge d'affaires* to London, even though official relations with Great Britain cannot be secured.

PARIS, Sept. 20.
The Republican papers of Paris generally give unqualified adhesion to Gambetta's definition of the party programme. The *Journal des Debats* agrees with Gambetta's object, but not entirely with his choice of the means; while the *Temps* makes some reservations.

The Catholic press regard the speech as a declaration of war against Catholicism. The Conservative journals generally criticize the speech keenly; and several express the opinion that Gambetta is trying to run with the Radicals and maintain his hold with the Opportunists at the same time. The speech has created a profound impression in all political circles.

The report that Leon Say, the Minister of Finance, is about to resign, is unfounded.

LONDON, Sept. 20.
The *Post's* Berlin dispatch says Prince Bismarck has a species of erysipelas and is confined to his bed. His physicians urge the necessity of his leaving Berlin immediately after his recovery.

LONDON, Sept. 20.
The *Times's* Constantinople correspondent has reason to believe negotiations have been opened between Russia and Turkey with the object of framing as a definite treaty those parts of the treaty of San Stefano affecting solely Russia and Turkey which were untouched by the treaty of Berlin.

Gen. Skoboleff with his corps commenced, on Friday, to retire towards Adrianople. The *Advertiser's* Berlin dispatch says: In accordance with the desire of the Czar, the project of establishing a Russian diplomatic agent at Cabul has been abandoned.

LONDON, Sept. 20.
News of a reciprocal treaty between the United States and Japan produces a remarkable sensation, especially in the British legation, where it is felt to be a great advance in American interests thus made, and that British influence will correspondingly decline.

The Emperor started on a journey through the northern provinces, on August 30th, accompanied by the members of the Imperial family and several ministers. He will be absent two months.

A Paris despatch says it is rumored M. Leon Say, Minister of Finance, will resign because his views conflict with Gambetta's about the conversion of 5 per cent. rentes. If Say resigns he probably will be appointed Governor of the Bank of France.

Hostile demonstrations against English missionaries in the interior of the Fankien Provinces, and a destruction of property and life are threatened. Consular authorities at Fochow are taking preventive measures. A decree has been issued by the vice-royal Nanking ordering the confiscation of every house rented for opium eating.

The inundation at Cingkiang caused great distress. Business is suspended in the Chinese quarters. Many houses were washed away and several lives were lost. The Governor General of Manchuria is about to be dispatched on a special message to Russia for the supposed purpose of remonstrating against Russian encroachment in the extreme North of China.

The Methodist Conference.

MONTREAL, Sept. 19.

The Methodist General Conference met again this morning. The following nominations were made and agreed to: British Conference—Drs. Ryerson and Pickard and Hon. J. Ferrier; to Methodist Episcopal Church of United States—Rev. E. H. DeWart, Mr. J. H. Davis and Dr. Inch; to Methodist Episcopal Church in the South—Rev. E. D. Harper, Rev. Joseph Hart, and Mr. Kennedy; to Australian Conference—Dr. Burwash, Rev. Jas. Graham, and J. B. Morris; to General Conference of Episcopal Church of Canada—Rev. Wm. Williams, Rev. Jas. Grey and Rev. John Shaw.

A committee was appointed to enquire into the relations of the mission fund to the superannuation fund of the three Western Conferences.

The following resolution was carried: That the claims of ministers to the superannuation fund shall not be prejudiced by their having been employed in the service of any department within or without the church, provided that such service is rendered by the appointment or with the consent of the Conference.

The Eurydice.

The Court-Martial sitting at Portsmouth to enquire into the circumstances attending the foundering of the "Eurydice," has given judgment. The court was unanimously of opinion that the ship was seaworthy, that she was efficiently commanded, and that her commander, during the critical period that culminated in the disaster, was upon the deck in the discharge of his duty; and the judgment clearly inferred that no blame was attached to any one for the calamity. The evidence, as the reports have shown, was of the most searching character.

The Lambeth Conference.

As much of the proceedings of the Lambeth Conference as were considered by the assembled prelates to be of essential importance to the church at large has been published in the form of a "Letter." This letter, which includes the reports of various committees, is addressed by the Archbishops, Bishops, Metropolitan and other Bishops of the Holy Catholic Church, in full communion with the Church of England, one hundred in number, all exercising superintendence over dioceses, or lawfully commissioned to exercise special functions therein, to "the faithful in Christ Jesus."

The first report is that of the Committee on the best mode of maintaining union among the various churches of the Anglican communion. After thankfully recognizing the evident and essential unity which has always existed, along with a necessary variety of custom, discipline and form of worship, the report regrets the impossibility, in the present state of Christendom, of holding a true general council, and the difficulties in the way of a Synod of all the Anglican Churches. It then mentions hopefully the twice-tried experiment of a conference of Bishops, and suggests that, in future, such conferences might be invested with larger liberty as to the initiation and selection of subjects for discussion. It then recognizes and sets forth certain principles of Church order as of great importance for the maintenance of such union. These principles are due respect by the others to the action of each church of the Anglican communion; avoidance of intrusion by one branch into the sphere of labor of another; and the strict enforcement of the system of letters testimonial. The Committee then treats separately of Church organization, common work, commendatory letters (to clergy-men visiting other churches and church members going from one country to another), the circulation of information as to the churches, the appointment of a common day of intercession for the unity of Christendom, and diversities of worship.

The report of the Committee on voluntary boards of arbitration for churches to which such an arrangement may be applicable, recommends that every ecclesiastical province, which has constituted for the exercise of discipline over its clergy a tribunal for receiving appeals from its diocesan courts, should be held responsible for its own decisions; that if any Province is desirous that its tribunal of appeal should have power to obtain the opinion of some council of reference before pronouncing sentence, the conditions of such reference should be determined by the province itself, and that in dioceses not yet, or geographically incapable of being combined into a Province appeals should be from the diocesan courts to the Archbishop of Canterbury. The remainder of this report relates to the method of conducting the trial of a bishop.

The report on the relation to each other of missionary bishops and of missionaries of the various branches of the Anglican communion acting in the same country, deals with the question of providing Prayer books for converts from heathenism, and of the boards by which such books should be approved; with the case of missions in countries not under British or American rule, and with the relations of bishops abroad to the missionaries in their districts or dioceses. The report of the Committee on the position of Anglican chaplains and chaplaincies on the continent of Europe and elsewhere, has for its object the decision of possible questions arising between English and American clergymen holding such positions in the same place, and to remove any conflicting of their ministrations. And this Committee was appointed to receive questions submitted to them, in writing, by bishops desiring the advice of the Conference on difficulties or problems they have met with in their several dioceses, and to report thereon. A list of subjects is given, to which the attention of this Committee was directed, with the answers of the committee. They are of interest, but it would take too much space to give even a resume of them here. These are the reports of the Lambeth Conference, to which the attention of the various Synods and other governing powers, as well as of the individual members of the several churches of the Anglican Communion is invited. In concluding the "Letter," His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury says: "We do not claim to be lords over God's heritage, but we commend the results of this our Conference to the reason and conscience of our brethren as enlightened by the Holy Spirit of God, praying that all throughout the world who call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ may be of one mind, may be of one fellowship, may hold fast the faith once delivered to the saints and worship their Lord in the spirit of purity and love."

It is said that the most corrupt means were practised by the Snowball party to secure the defeat of Mr. Peter Mitchell. The *Moncton Times* understands that the election will be contested and Mr. Snowball unseated, when Northumberland will again have an opportunity of electing a representative of ability and one who will have some weight with the party in power.

A Berlin despatch to the *London Post* says the Emperor William is desirous of resuming the reins of government next month.
