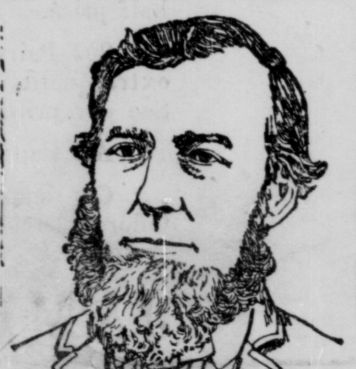

THE GREATEST SPARKLER.

The Excelsior Diamond Traveler Under a Military Escort.

When a diamond is found weighing more than a hundred carats the news is usually heralded with much ado. It is not to be wondered at, for the first finding of the "Excelsior" excited a considerable excitement. It weighed in the rough 97 carats, and was found near Jagersfontein in the Orange River of the British colony. It was found to be a white stone of the first water, but had a small flaw in the center. The inspector of the mine, a Swedish named Jorgensen, was the lucky find. The preparations of the mine, Jorgensen, and Bernheim, had the stone tested and valued by experts, who agreed that the value was \$5,000.00. It is a fact that this value of \$5,000.00 and \$10,000.00 per carat, has been a record for the most great precautions were taken for its protection. A squad of cavalry escorted it to the railway station. In Capetown it was placed aboard the British steamer "H. M. S. Annapolis," which brought the precious stone to London, where it now rests in the fire and burglar proof vaults of the Bank of England.
The next largest diamond in the world is the one named by the name of Matin, on the island of Borneo; this one weighs 367 carats. The largest of all the large diamonds known is, however, the one in the French collection of crown jewels, known as the "Regent," which weighs 136.34 carats. Louis XV. paid \$300,000 francs for it, but now it is valued at 10,000,000 francs, or \$2,000,000.
How much the "Excelsior" will be in cutting can only be decided by eminent experts. As a rule, the larger diamonds lose fully one-half of their weight in the operation. Naturally the cutting, which is done with a view to having as few large pieces as possible outside of the main gem, must be carried on with the greatest care. This brings us around mainly to an American diamond cutter, an American diamond cutter, as it is called, who has cut up five large diamonds of 100, 150, 200, 300, and 400 carats each, and has cut up 2,000 smaller diamonds, besides a large number of less important concerns.—Philadelphia Record.

OUR TWO LANGUAGES.

One That We Use in Conversation, the Other in Written English.

A writer in the current number of the Educational Review prefaces an extremely interesting article on English that prevailed in the college by the declaration, "It is now, I think, generally admitted that the first principle of rhetoric is, write as you speak. The pedantic, declamatory, Latinized diction that prevailed in literary circles a hundred years ago is no longer the standard King's English. In order to write well it is necessary first to speak well—that is, to speak naturally, correctly and straightforwardly."
This is a clever and cunning, as well as complete bogging of the whole question. The assumption that we, English and Americans speak as we write, and that the ordinary rules of grammar and rhetoric of the English language are, as well as written language, is an assumption which cannot be verified by evidence. He who says "don't" and "can't" and "it's" and who talks about "him and me" and "we and I" means "he and I" or "we and I" or "done" for "did," or "been" for "saw." can take his pen or pencil in hand and write English which is unexceptionable, correct and straightforward in form, mood or tense, the fact being that written language is a refinement, and, possibly, an improvement on spoken language, but at the same time as different from it as the dialect of Yorkshire from that of Cornwall, or the talk of Yankeland from the patois of the uplands of North Carolina or the lowlands of Louisiana.
The writer of the article in question has fallen into the rhetorical error of the cart before the horse. Every written language, protected and fenced in as it may be by rhetorical fences and hedged about with rules and maxims, to those rules, is only a development from a spoken language, and whether it be an improvement or not is an open question. At all events, it is not apparent to every student of literature or philology that we have, at present in English, two separate and distinct languages, and that if we should attempt to follow the dictum of the writer in the article, we should be obliged to speak our own contributions to current literature would be speedily side-tracked into the editor's waste paper basket. It might be better for the sake of the English language, and for the preservation of its integrity, that we should speak as we write, and write as we speak. The very claim that is made by those who know and appreciate the distinction between English "as she is written" and "as she is spoken."—San Francisco Chronicle.

"You can see the very clamp in an incredibly short time, and when it is once on need never be taken off, as it will never wear out. I have spoken to several bicycle dealers in regard to it, and they all say it is the best tire they have ever seen. 'Your fortune is made,' said the rider, 'if it is as elastic as the pneumatic tire.' When asked of what material it was composed, the man only shook his head and said, 'I don't know, but it is a pure tire that will not be a quarter as expensive as the pneumatic.' —The longest chapter is the 19th Psalm.
—The shortest and middle chapter is the 117th Psalm.
—The middle verse is the 8th of the 118th Psalm.
—The longest name is the 8th chapter of Isaiah.
—The 37th chapter of Isaiah and the 19th chapter of the 24 book of Kings are alike.
—The longest verse is the 9th of the 8th chapter of Esther; the shortest the 31st of the 11th chapter of John.
—The 21st verse of the 7th chapter of Ecclesiastes is the only one of the entire book which contains every letter in the alphabet.
—The word "Lord," or its equivalent, "Jehovah," occurs 7,558 times in the Old Testament, and 1,200 times in the New.
—The word "Lord" occurs 1,253 times, and the word "Jehovah" 5,305 times.
—The word "God" does not occur in the book of Esther, but it occurs 14,789 times in the Bible.
—Don't Neglect the Teeth.

A dentist whose practice has been for many years largely a one person who would commonly be called "a refined and cultured class," finds the neglect of cleanliness of the mouth among children of such persons most astonishing. "These children are being trained in all the arts and sciences," he says, "but in one school they have were 700 pupils, 500 of them from 10 to 15 years of age, only fifty cleaned their teeth twice a day, fifty used a brush sometimes, and 175 did not own a toothbrush. In the primary department, where there were 200 children from 5 to 10 years of age, it was found that not more than 10 were provided with toothbrushes." Further inquiry and investigation showed that the school was not an exception in this regard. Dr. Ritter of Philadelphia found that of 67 persons, 400 of whom were under 15 years of age, only forty-one had a toothbrush, and 5 per cent. had no toothbrush at all. The Excelsior Diamond Traveler Under a Military Escort.
When a diamond is found weighing more than a hundred carats the news is usually heralded with much ado. It is not to be wondered at, for the first finding of the "Excelsior" excited a considerable excitement. It weighed in the rough 97 carats, and was found near Jagersfontein in the Orange River of the British colony. It was found to be a white stone of the first water, but had a small flaw in the center. The inspector of the mine, a Swedish named Jorgensen, was the lucky find. The preparations of the mine, Jorgensen, and Bernheim, had the stone tested and valued by experts, who agreed that the value was \$5,000.00. It is a fact that this value of \$5,000.00 and \$10,000.00 per carat, has been a record for the most great precautions were taken for its protection. A squad of cavalry escorted it to the railway station. In Capetown it was placed aboard the British steamer "H. M. S. Annapolis," which brought the precious stone to London, where it now rests in the fire and burglar proof vaults of the Bank of England.
The next largest diamond in the world is the one named by the name of Matin, on the island of Borneo; this one weighs 367 carats. The largest of all the large diamonds known is, however, the one in the French collection of crown jewels, known as the "Regent," which weighs 136.34 carats. Louis XV. paid \$300,000 francs for it, but now it is valued at 10,000,000 francs, or \$2,000,000.
How much the "Excelsior" will be in cutting can only be decided by eminent experts. As a rule, the larger diamonds lose fully one-half of their weight in the operation. Naturally the cutting, which is done with a view to having as few large pieces as possible outside of the main gem, must be carried on with the greatest care. This brings us around mainly to an American diamond cutter, an American diamond cutter, as it is called, who has cut up five large diamonds of 100, 150, 200, 300, and 400 carats each, and has cut up 2,000 smaller diamonds, besides a large number of less important concerns.—Philadelphia Record.
