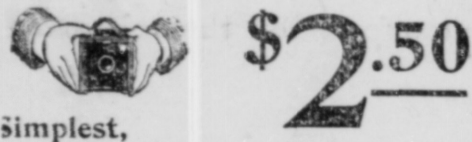

TAILOR CUT CORSETS

The long crossed silk stitching at the ends of corset bones or steels is termed the "flushing." Its purpose is to prevent the cutting and slipping through of the steels. Flushing to be done properly must be done by hand and the stitches must go through—otherwise it is sham.

Ordinary corsets "flushing" is done by machine, and no machine in existence can do genuine "flushing."
