

# Committee Reports Read At Board Of Trade Meeting

A substantial adjustment in municipal taxes is anticipated this year, was indicated by Mr. John Mungall, president of the Summerside Board of Trade at the 58th annual meeting held last night. He also stressed that the Board should guard against higher taxes as they tend to discourage new industry and the expansion of existing plants and business.

In dealing with the growth both in size and importance of the town of Summerside Mr. Mungall noted that the town had acquired a Civic Stadium and that a new High School and auditorium are being built. The demands for water, sewerage and paving have become heavy. The wheat sheds which have been completed have proved to be a fine asset to the town, but due to the substantial tonnage being handled shed space is still inadequate. The seawall now under construction will be completed this year.

With regard to the early freezing of the harbour last fall, he said that all in the area were indebted to Mr. Watson MacNaught, M. P. for Prince County, in his successful efforts to obtain an extension of the time the car ferry Prince Edward Island would be kept in operation, before it was taken out of service for the winter months. This greatly improved the facilities for the movement of potatoes at this season.

**TRANSPORTATION**  
In dealing with the work of the Transportation Committee, he said that transportation has been and will continue to be an important factor in the economy of the Island. We have never had and it is doubtful if we can ever hope to be on an equality with other Canadian Provinces in this matter. Due to the congested conditions which frequently occur at both Borden and Tormentine, now may be the time to commence planning for a new port in the old Scotia II which is now tied up at Gaspe awaiting opportunity to proceed to Quebec

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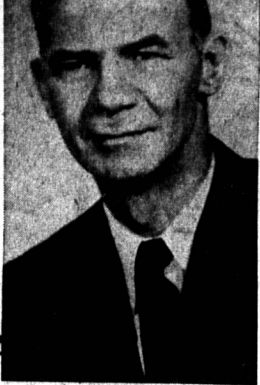

## ARTIFICIAL

Why not establish our own bull stud on Prince Edward Island? was the question posed by Dr. Fisher. In answer to this, he said that the New Brunswick unit is set up to handle all of the Maritime Provinces and it would only add to the expense of operation to have a smaller unit within this Province.

## SOUND ORGANIZATION

Dr. Fisher referred to the unit which had been established in the Province about eight years ago. He said that he had not yet learned all the reasons why this unit was allowed to fold up. But one thing he did learn was that it was not organized on a sound basis.

He emphasized the importance of keeping records both from a breeding standpoint and from a financial angle. Dr. Fisher said "cash on the line" must be the policy since the inseminator is required to make his returns per service whether he receives it from the breeder or not.

Dr. Fisher stated that the percentage of conception on first breeding is about 70 while that expected by natural means is about 65. He expressed the hope that within a short time the whole Province would be covered by an artificial insemination breeding plan.

After a period of questions, the breeders divided into discussion groups and named their various areas and named their various areas and named their various areas.

## FROZEN SEMEN

Dr. Fisher said that the majority of semen being produced by the New Brunswick unit is "fresh" and is shipped daily as required. He explained that frozen semen is becoming more and more widely used and predicted that within the near future, this would be the only method employed.

The cost of insemination to the breeder is to be not less than \$4 and not more than \$5, to be determined by the club. The inseminator is paid \$3 and the balance of the fee goes to the club for operating expenses such as transportation of the semen from Fredericton and replacement of insemination equipment.

## Currencies

**MONTREAL (CP)**—The U. S. dollar closed Wednesday at a discount of 16 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, unchanged. It took 99 15-16 cents Canadian to buy \$1 American. Pound sterling \$2.90 1-16, down 1/16.

B. I. Rayner was re-elected president of the Prince County branch of the P. E. I. Fish and Game Association at the annual meeting held last evening in the Summerside Armouries with 26 members and interested sportsmen present. Also in attendance was Mr. Walter Beers, Charlottetown provincial president of the association who was most helpful in providing information on various matters before the meeting.

Mr. Reg Rogers, Borden was re-elected vice-president and Mr. Glydon Willis, Kensington secretary-treasurer, succeeding Mr. Norman MacLeod who has held that position for the past five years.

**ANNUAL REPORT**  
Mr. Rayner in his annual report stressed the importance of reporting the names of offenders who hunt and fish illegally to the proper authorities. He said that only through the co-operation of association members and non-members as well, in reporting violators, could they be rightfully prosecuted and consequently these illegal acts could be drastically reduced. Mr. Rayner told members it is their duty to report the names of offenders.

He stated that very little stream improvement work has been done in Prince County this past year but this was mainly due to the fact that a number of projects had been successfully completed in past years and the other counties are now being assisted by the Department of Natural Resources. He said that as soon as the Bonshaw project is complete, he had been given assurance that the Sterling Lord Pond will receive the attention of the department. He added that Nornings Pond has been deemed by the department as too small, with insufficient water to go ahead with stream improvement at that location.

Mr. Rayner extended sincere thanks to Norman MacLeod for his tireless efforts on behalf of the association over the past years and this was followed by a vote of thanks on behalf of the gathering by P. C. Martin and seconded by D. P. MacKinnon.

Mr. MacLeod gave a verbal report that he received from Game Warden Walter Bernard, who was unable to be present. In his report the game warden said that 1,300 lbs. of feed for game birds had been purchased and placed in the western part of Prince County where they had suffered most from the winter storms.

**PHEASANTS AND QUAIL**  
In regard to a letter from the provincial branch seeking information on whether the local branch wants pheasants released in Prince County, a resolution was approved stating that the branch is desirous of receiving 500 pheasants brought in and released as soon as possible at the lowest possible price.

The branch also approved a resolution stating they do not wish the present quail raising program extended at this time and in regard to a change of dates for trapping muskrat, the branch decided to leave this to the discretion of the provincial association.

The meeting was sparked by some lively discussion on various topics including the use of dogs in hunting and whether or not there is a scarcity of huns. But much information was forthcoming from several members and much good achieved on these matters through their forthright discussions.

Prizes to the winners of last year's cross-shoot were awarded by Mr. MacLeod. In the senior division, Gordon Kennedy, Kensington was top gunner with 127 and in the junior competition Kaye Hansen Jr., brought down a total of 40.

Frank Howatt, Carleton and Robert Palmer, Summerside were appointed directors for the coming year which will now officially end the last of December instead of in June due to an amendment to the constitution of the association passed at the annual meeting of the parent body in Charlottetown.

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# New Fishery Patrol Boats For Maritime Provinces Launched



Donald A. Nicholson Appointment

The appointment of Donald A. Nicholson as representative of the Maritime Life Assurance Company at Summerside is announced by Island Branch Manager, Mr. Nicholson taught school in several island communities and has more recently been associated with the Federal Government in the field of accountancy. He returned from Halifax this week where he attended a two week sales training course at the Head Office of the Company.

The first of two new 42-foot patrol boats for the Federal Department of Fisheries was launched Wednesday morning at Dartmouth. The announcement was made Monday by Loran E. Baker, Chief Supervisor for the Maritimes Area.

Of wooden hull construction the two vessels will be used in the Maritimes to replace two smaller patrol vessels which are being retired. Christening ceremonies for the first of the new patrol boats — the Myra II — will take place before department officials at the yard of Hugh D. Weagle.

The traditional bottle will be broken over the stem by Mrs. J.A. MacLeod, wife of Capt. MacLeod, Marine Supervisor of the Department for the Maritimes. The design of the new boats was adapted by Capt. MacLeod from original model by Francis Keizer of Bickerton.

The second boat — the Modiolus II — will be launched in about two weeks time. It is presently nearing completion in the same yard. The two boats will replace boats of similar name at Pictou and Lower Wedgeport.

The new patrol boats have a 12-foot beam. Of 14 gross tons, they are powered by single screws driven by diesel engines and will have an expected cruising speed of 11 knots. They have accommodations for three in the forecabin, and normally will be crewed by two-man crews in fisheries protection work. They will be equipped with radio-telephone in addition to other usual navigational aids.
