

R.C.A.F. Shade MCA 5-4 In Opening Game Of Island Intermediate Series

Bill Green's single in the bottom of the ninth batted home coach Ross Burns, who had slammed out a pinch hit double, and the R.C.A.F. won a spine tingling game from M.C.A. at the Airport Diamond yesterday evening by the score of 5-4. The game was the first in the series for the Island Intermediate Baseball championship.

The Royals were leading 4-1 at the end of the seventh inning and Hardy Dawe, keeping the M.C.A. hits well scattered and supported in superb fashion by his mates, looked good enough to win by a three run margin. But in the top of the eighth the Airways boys started to sting the ball a little harder and the R.C.A.F. infield blew up, committing three of the four errors in that frame. This, coupled with two Charlottetown hits, gave the visitors three runs to tie up the ball game.

The count remained deadlocked until, with two out, Green poked the winning single over second base to score Burns from the keystone sack.

The game was studded with sparkling fielding plays and fairly heavy hitting. Bill Green, in addition to his blue ribbon single in the ninth, came up with two smart catches, one off McAleer in the fourth, the other off Lorne Hennessey in the seventh.

The infield work of both teams was steady, if not spectacular, with the exception of the booting spree the Royals staged in the eighth inning. Petty, big Royal catcher, coming into third on a run-down play in the sixth inning, collided with Glen Matheson and the Charlottetown boy went down with an injured shoulder. Matheson, though obviously still suffering from the

misshap, gamely remained in the game.

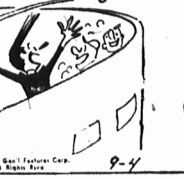
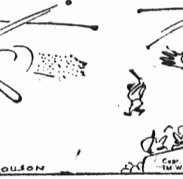
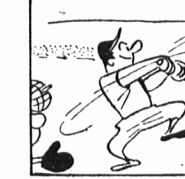
