This deal occurred in the recent open pairs event of the East-Town Tournament, and at one table, where all of the players were supposed to be experts, the bidding proceeded:

Undoubtedly, the bids sometimes made by "experts" amaze and disgust players who simply go in for a good, sound game of contract bridge, and there is little doubt that the bidding just recorded will produce this effect on readers of this report. It is no part of this observer's duty to try to excuse the foibles of tournament players, but, by way of explanation, West was undoubtedly trying to trap South if he reached too high a contract, whereas East, in reopening the bidding after North's pass, was simply going in for some desperate "competition."

Particularly since the East-West pair was also vulnerable, it is impossible to excuse the action of either player, but the bid that capped the climax was West's double of two hearts! The "trap" he had laid in the first place was extremely flimsy, and even though North confessed dire weakness by refusing to hold the heart bid open, West himself had nothing resembling the tricks for a double!

The lucky North-South team earned a "top" on this board that was far beyond comparison! West opened the diamond king, and when he saw East's nine, laid down the diamond ace in hope that East had a singleton. He then shifted to a club, but South won, cashed the heart ace, then led a low heart! The result was that South made £70 points!
