AMERICAN TROOPS ON CUBAN SOIL

The Landing Was Made Yesterday.

TRANSPORTS ARRIVE AFTER A QUIET VOYAGE.

General Shafter is Now Getting His Army Ashore.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The first American troops were landed on Cuban soil yesterday.

General Shafter's transport, after an uneventful journey from Tampa, began to sight the outlying ships of Sampson's squadron late on Saturday night, and yesterday was devoted to getting the first section of the army ashore.

The landing place was Aguardores, a town eight miles from Santiago.

No one can yet tell when the first battle will occur. It may be that the Spanish will contest every foot of the army's advance just as they did at Guantanamo, but the probability is that the insurgents under Garcia and Rabi have been able to mass themselves between Aguardores and Santiago and thus prevent active opposition on the part of the Spaniards.

MANILA REPORTED SURRENDERED.

By a Missile from the U. S. Ship Vesuvius.

LONDON, June 20.—The Gibraltar correspondent of the Telegraph says that Admiral Camara's squadron arrived at Cartagena, on Saturday evening.

The destination of the fleets is unknown, but it is believed Camara will keep in touch with the home ports and that the squadron will be used to deceive the Americans.

NEW YORK, June 20.—A despatch from Santiago says that spies report to Admiral Sampson that the Spanish General Joral and several officers were killed by a gun-cotton explosion at the first trial of the batteries of the Vesuvius.

STRIKE ON OTTAWA RIVER.

OTTAWA, June 20.—A squad of twelve Dominion policemen, returned from Rockland, 25 miles down the Ottawa river, badly battered in a conflict with 500 striking mill men.

These are the employees of Edward's, M. P., for Russell, who through influence with the Government, had the Dominion policemen to quiet the disturbances.

The force could do nothing, however, against such odds, and left the strikers in charge of the mill premises.

Probably the militia will be called out.

ANGLICAN SYNOD DIVORCE.

TORONTO, June 20.—The Anglican Synod has passed a resolution condemning marriage of divorced persons and requesting the Provincial Synods to make a declaration on the subject.

INQUEST.—An inquest in view of the body of Martin Hogan, who was drowned at Senter's mills, was held on Saturday afternoon before Dr. Conroy, coroner, and a jury composed of Robert C Ford, (foreman) John M Coles, Daniel Chapman, Michael Heanessey, John Diamond, Samuel Gillespie and William DeCost. The evidence taken was along the lines of the story already published, and the following verdict was returned: "That the deceased, Martin Hogan, came to his death by drowning as a result of a fall from a raft on which he was standing, he suffering at the time from some sudden physical weakness which rendered him unable to rescue himself." The body was brought to the city after the inquest, and interred yesterday afternoon. The funeral was largely attended.

SPANISH FLAG AT HALF-MAST

Flying Over a Fort at Santiago.

THOUGHT TO MEAN THAT HOBSON IS DEAD.

Causes Much Excitement Among Americans.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OFF SANTIAGO, June 20.—A curious circumstance of the bombardment is a flag flying half-mast at Morro Castle.

It is not customary to display this mark of death in warfare, although possibly some prominent Spanish officer was killed.

It is suggested that the flag denotes that Hobson and his companions are dead, but if this is so, they were wantonly murdered, because no shot from the fleet touched the walls of Morro Castle.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The authorities are inclined to discredit the Santiago report that Hobson and his brave companions have been killed.

Secretary Long doubts if they dare murder them, and believes the flag was raised half-mast over Morro Castle as a mark of respect for some Spanish officers who are dead.

Subordinate naval officers, however, are inclined to believe that Hobson and his brave associates were murdered, and predict that if the report proves true, speedy vengeance will be dealt out to the Spaniards about Santiago, from the Admiral down to the privates.

SPANISH FLEET AT SEA.

GIBRALTAR, June 20.—The captain of a British steamer which has arrived here reports that he sighted a Spanish squadron off Cape Gata a promontory of Spain on the coast of Granada forming the Eastern limit of Gulf Almeria.
