County Court At Georgetown

County Court Judge J. S. DesRoches presided at the regular sitting of the County Court for the First Circuit of Kings on Tuesday, September 2nd and Wednesday, September 3rd at Georgetown.

Judgment of non-suit was handed down in a case for damages for wrongful taking and conversion. In this case the plaintiff was a resident of Montague and the defendant was residents of Georgetown.

A case in which an out-of-province company was the plaintiff and a Georgetown resident the defendant, in an action for money payable for balance of price of goods sold, was adjourned to the October sitting of the court. In an action for goods sold and delivered, the plaintiff, a resident of Georgetown was awarded judgment over the defendant, also a resident of Georgetown.

The trustees of Georgetown School District No. 1 in the County of Kings, were given judgment in seven cases, in which the defendants, all district rate-payers, were in arrears of school taxes.

On Wednesday, a resident of Montague was awarded judgment against the defendant, a resident of Gaspeaux, in a case for damages, arising from a collision of two motor vehicles, on the Georgetown-Charlottetown highway in March, 1952. Court adjourned to the October sitting.
