Town's '64 Balance Wiped Out By Bills

GEORGETOWN — In reporting for the finance committee of Georgetown Town Council Monday night Coun. J.W. Lavers stated that although the financial statement as of Dec. 31, showed a balance of \$4,782.00, this amount has now been wiped out by bills which have been presented to the council since it took over commitments made by the former administration.

The largest of these was an amount of \$3,691.57 from Canadian-British Engineering Consultants for a report on water and sewer systems. The necessity of having this report has been questioned by some members of the present council, as they feel that the information it contained could have been made available to the town from the survey made for Atlantic Development Board.

A letter was received from John Mullally, MP, regarding the possibility of obtaining office space in the post office building should the town be successful in its efforts to obtain a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to police the town under contract. The matter of obtaining office space is to be followed up by having the clerk write the dominion government department of public works. Correspondence was read regarding the placing of insurance on the town's fire fighting vehicles and this matter is to be further negotiated with the insurance company.

A number of bills were ordered paid, including the insurance premium on the town hall; bills for oil for the heating of the town hall and the fire hall, electric light account, equipment for fire hall, advertising and other accounts that are monthly. The matter of the registration renewal for the tank truck and hose truck is to be taken care of by the clerk.

The council instructed the clerk to write Canadian National Railways regarding the possibility of the town obtaining a portion of railway property situated north of Grafton Street. Other matters that were discussed at length was the agreement with industries located here, made by the former administration, whereby the town is receiving a grant in lieu of taxes and which limits the tax potential to the town.

The council also familiarized itself with the extent of common lands which had been given to P.E.I. Industrial Corporation, and which involved approximately 126 acres out of the total common acreage of 165 acres; leaving the town now in possession of only approximately 39 acres. It was also decided to write Atlantic Development Board's agents in the province for a copy of the survey conducted for ADB, by Laurie A. Coles and Associates.

Prov. Civil Service To Recruit In Schools

The provincial civil service commission plans to carry out during the year a recruitment program in high schools and colleges. The 1964 report of the commission was tabled in the Legislature yesterday.

Regarding the recruitment program, the commission will, in the beginning, endeavor to arrange for one of its members to speak with students regarding the job opportunities in the

public service and to draw to the attention of students the opportunity of furthering their education in certain fields through government bursaries, at technical institutes and universities. During the year, the staff of the classified civil service increased by 63 which was an increase of 5.5 per cent over the previous year. In 1964, the rate of turnover in the service was 19.5 per cent of which 8.8 per cent were males and 10.7 per cent were females. The majority of personnel turnover is in the salary range of under \$3,000 per year.
