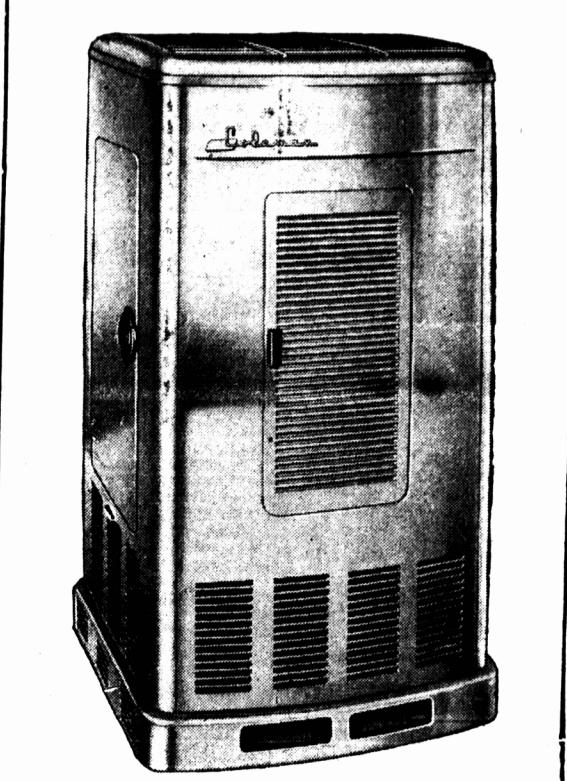
New Glasgow
