

Severe Fighting Predicted.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Mr. Wm. G. Macartney, M. P., and Secretary to the Admiralty, in a speech at Stockton warned the public to prepare to see a severe struggle in South Africa within the next few weeks. They must not be induced by reports of successful fights to believe that the British forces at present in South Africa are able to overcome the combined resources of the Transvaal and the Orange Free State before the arrival of an army corps. It must be remembered that the British were dealing with an enemy who had proved stubborn, successful, and well armed. On the other hand, the public should not be depressed on learning that the British generals were on the defensive, choosing to protect the future rather than to risk the present. The highest military authorities at home strongly approve of Gen. White's and Gen. Buller's movements.

TOO LOYAL FOR TARTE.

Mr. Bergeron, the able member for Beauharnois, said at a public meeting:

"Loyal Quebec was ashamed of the Master of the Administration at this juncture. If volunteers were called for 5,000 Frenchmen would spring to arms. It was Girouard, of Quebec, who built Kitchener's railway up the Nile. When trouble comes to this fair land of ours or the Empire was in peril the French of Quebec would stand side by side with their English-speaking brethren in defence of the British flag."

Mr. Tarte does not like this sentiment. He declares that Mr. Bergeron is an "Orangeiste," and "a follower of Tupper," and adds:

"I am a minister of the British Government. I have liberty to call myself French; but if it is desired that I should declare myself a British citizen, and it is desired to prevent me calling myself French, then I refuse to call myself a British subject. We are happy and free under British institutions; but France is also my dear Mother Country."

"What have we to do with things in Africa? Why should we take the money and the blood of our people to spend them in such far-away regions?"
And this is the teaching that comes from our Ottawa Government.
