The mother of the young man Archibald Gillis, who was killed by an explosion of dynamite at Glace Bay last fall, has entered an action against the Dominion Coal Company to recover damages. The amount claimed is \$10,000.

The steamer Albert, Neilson, master, arrived yesterday morning from Charlottetown, P. E. I., with a cargo of oats and produce for North Sydney merchants from Messrs. Carvell Bros. The Albert will load coal at the victory pier for Halifax.—North Sydney Herald.

A MEMORIAL SERVICE.

For the late Elijah Purdy, who was buried on Sunday last, will be held in the Salvation Army Barracks on Sunday evening, 12th inst. Mr. Purdy was for several years a devoted and loyal soldier of the Army. The service will commence at 8 o'clock.

FIRE AT FORT AUGUSTUS.
