Island Mixed Curlers Lose Game To Alberta

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. (CP) - Manitoba grabbed a share of first place with Northern Ontario Friday as Ernie Boushy of Winnipeg trounced Nova Scotia 14-5 in the ninth round of the national mixed curling championship.

Lee Kalichak of Goose Bay opened the door for Boushy, mixed champion in 1964, by directing his Newfoundland four to a 10-8 verdict over Bill Tetley and his Northern Ontario rink from Port Arthur.

It was Tetley's second straight loss, dropping him to Manitoba's six victory-two loss level.

Lee Green of Calgary and his defending champion Alberta rink missed a chance to create a three-way scramble for top place when he lost 6-5 to Harvey Acton of Uxbridge, Ont.

Alberta's 5-3 ledger was good for a share of third place with Glen Harper of Duncan, whose British Columbia rink had the bye.

Arthur Woodley of Campbellton, the victim of four defeats, moved even with Green and Harper in the victory column by beating Doug Bell's Prince Edward Island representatives from Charlottetown 8-5.

Ted Jurista of Vaseco moved his Saskatchewan rink even with Newfoundland in sixth place—both with 44 marks—with an 8-7 decision over Art Lobel of Lachute, Que.

Trailing the pack were Prince Edward Island (3 - 5), Nova Scotia (3-6), Quebec and Ontario (2-4).

The ninth-round results set the stage for a head-to-head Manitoba-Northern Ontario clash for the title in the final round today.

But first Manitoba had to dispose of Alberta and Tetley had to sidetrack Saskatchewan in the 10th round at 8 p.m. EST Friday. Nova Scotia met Ontario, Quebec faced Newfoundland and B.C. played P.E.I. in other 10th round games while New Brunswick had the bye.

Tetley fell into the loss rut in the eighth round when he was the victim of a 10-7 score by Herb MacNeill's Nova Scotia quartet from Sydney. On adjacent ice sheets, Harper shaded Jurista 7-6. Woodley clipped Acton 15-0. Lobel beat Bell 8-5 and Boushy stopped Kalichak 6-3.

The winner of the series earns the privilege to travel to New Brunswick to play in the Maritime Midget tourney which will be held in the home rink of the eventual N.B. winner. The game gets underway at 7:00 o'clock and good hockey is the order of the day to plan to be on hand.

KAMLOOPS, B.C. (CP) - Nova Scotia came from behind to defeat Alberta 11-9 and earn a berth in the finals of the Royal Canadian Legion national curling championship here Friday.

They will meet the Garth Ruitter rink of Quebec starting at 5 p.m. PST (8 p.m. EST) in the final.

The Frank Hoar rink of Nova Scotia trailed 9-8 after the eleventh end and scored three coming home to reach the final.

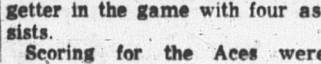
