

Waterloo Was Not So Long Ago

QUEBEC (CP)—After 60 years of married life Lt.-Col. George Addie, 89, finds "it's still a question of who is boss."

His wife, a sprightly 82, says "there never has been anything unpleasant."

The Addies, married in Sherbrooke, Que., in 1897—the year of Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee—have just celebrated their own diamond wedding anniversary. Both were born in Sherbrooke but now live in Quebec City.

Lt.-Col. Addie started his army career as a second lieutenant with the Sherbrooke Regiment in 1890. He later attended McGill University in Montreal, graduating with a B.Sc. in 1899—making him one of that university's oldest alumni.

In 1906, he was posted to Quebec as district intelligence officer. He later became a life member of the Engineering Institute of Canada and of the Quebec Corporation of Land Surveyors. He retired just five years ago.

"I'm now the oldest land surveyor in the province," he states.

The couple have four children, four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

As a young officer, Lt.-Col. Addie commanded the firing party in 1890 at the funeral of Sherbrooke's last veteran of the Battle of Waterloo. The service, for drummer boy Morris Shea, was held in Sherbrooke Cathedral.

"The three volleys at the grave side were the perfect I've ever heard," Lt.-Col. Addie recalled. "It was the biggest event of my life—except when I got married."

Chinese Deaths Said Justified

HONG KONG (AP)—Communists China sentenced to death 16.8 per cent of all "counter-revolutionaries" it captured between 1949 and 1952, Premier Chou En lai said Wednesday.

Peiping radio said Chou, in reporting to the People's Congress, said they were given capital punishment "because they had committed heinous crimes and public wrath was extremely strong against them."

Chou did not reveal the number of persons killed or imprisoned during the suppression period. A report from Poland purporting to come from chairman Mao Tze tung's Feb. 27 speech said the Red leader admitted liquidating 800,000.

"The sentences were absolutely necessary at the time," Chou said. He said 42.3 per cent were sentenced to reform through labor but of these 25.6 per cent had been released or placed in production jobs after serving sentences.
