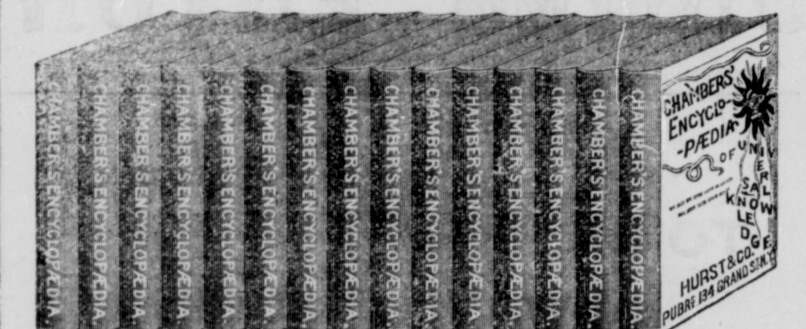

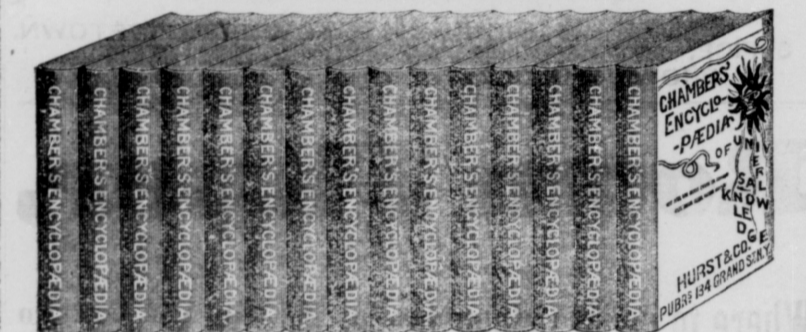

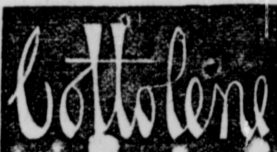

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### Grow Corn!

Sir,—The present scarcity of fodder in the eastern sections of the Province should bring prominently into consideration the best means of averting this undesirable state of affairs in the future. A scarcity of feed, due to long continued drought, is felt more severely in these districts where the soil is light and sandy in character, and the burden falls the most heavily on those who are least able to bear it. While it would be evidently unjust to attribute to these farmers what is due to the acts of Providence, yet it is their duty under the circumstances, as well as in their interests, to devise means of meeting the possibility of a similar famine in the future. One of the most lamentable features that an occasion of this kind brings into prominence, is the lack of interest and sympathy manifested by the more prosperous farmer for his less fortunate brother, and which is all the more unkind when we consider the fact that the circumstances in which the average farmer finds himself to-day is mainly due to the mere chance of location. To illustrate this idea let us suppose that two intending settlers enter a new district for the purpose of selecting homesteads. The rich soil of a certain claim attracts the eye of the first arrival who at once secures it, while the settler who arrives the next day must content himself with the very much inferior land that adjoins it. The one, by the exercise of the utmost industry and intelligence, is scarcely able to eke out a bare subsistence, while the other, with possibly less exertion, becomes wealthy and independent, not so much by his own efforts as by drawing on the store that nature has been laying up in the soil for thousands of years, and to which all are surely entitled to share equally. It would not have been hard at the outset to predict what the relative positions of these men would be in course of time. It will readily be seen that it was not so much the ability and energy of the men themselves that had to do with determining their circumstances, and consequently their influence and social standing, as the mere chance of a lucky homestead selection. A little more consideration of these matters would lend an entirely different aspect to affairs, as the successful ones might begin to realize that chance has, perhaps, been as great a factor in their prosperity as any ability of their own. But these considerations apart, the fact remains that it is customary for the more highly circumstanced farmer, when dealing with his less fortunate neighbor, to act on the principle of "your necessity is my opportunity,"—a failing, however, common to the rest of mankind. Often must the distressed and unfortunate farmer, when compelled in a time of scarcity to purchase what his own soil does not produce, bitterly realize that the tender mercies of the extortioner are cruel. But we believe it to be possible for him to place himself in a more favorable position. Extensive experiments have proved that western fodder corn will thrive on soil of our Island Province, and that light sandy soils are best adapted for its cultivation, and being a prairie plant is but little affected by dry weather; light soils, not adapted to growing hay and roots, with liberal manuring and thorough cultivation, will yield a larger return of fodder corn than lower and heavier land, and fifteen tons per acre may thus be grown, having a value equal to half its weight of hay.

Though much has been written of late on this subject, yet it appears to the writer that the most important results that have been attained when those farmers who, under present conditions, often find themselves seriously embarrassed for want of fodder, are enabled to place themselves, by its assistance, beyond the results of a dry season and the consequent exactions of their fellows, and every effort should be made to turn their attention in this direction. If those who have not already done so would try the experiment, on a small scale at first if necessary, they would find it vastly cheaper and better than two-year-old wheat straw at ten dollars a ton.

## Terrible Struggle for Life.

CAPT. JOHN W. CAMPBELL WASHED FROM HIS VESSEL AND DROWNED.

A despatch from Provincetown, Mass., says the schr. *Jesse T. Matheson*, laden with salt herring, arrived from Bay of Islands, via St. Pierre, on the 22nd, with flag half-mast for Capt. John W. Campbell, who was washed overboard by a heavy sea Tuesday, 18th inst., when 24 miles off the head of the cape.

When the sea boarded the vessel the cabin was filled and bulwarks burst outward. The boat was smashed and everything movable swept from the decks. The crew sprang to assist the captain, who was entangled in the main sheets, towing in the wake. The craft would not lift, and was going through the water at a nine-knot speed. The men hauled the captain part way to the vessel, when the tangled ropes slipped from his legs. He grasped other parts with both hands, and with arms outstretched above his head, was towed backward, but before the crew could get him aboard he lost his grasp and sank, having evidently sustained injury when the sea crashed overboard.

Capt. Campbell was married, has resided here many years, was about 37 years of age and was born in North Mountain, West Bay, Cape Breton.

## The Grand Trunk Railway.

LONDON, April 24.—The half-yearly meeting of the Grand Trunk Railway was held to-day. There was not much interest manifested in the meeting, for the report already issued apparently impressed the stockholders with the idea that there was nothing to be done except to await results from the expected increase in passenger traffic to the World's Fair. Sir Henry Tyler began his statements by remarking that the past year's records had been most depressing. He could not, however, attribute blame for the falling off in receipts to the officials in charge of the management. Their efforts had certainly been heroic in the work of economy. To such a fine point were the expenses reduced that no further economy, consistent with the proper running of the road, could be indulged in. The only hope in the situation he continued, was to increase freight rates. The other speakers, of whom there were not many, urged that an increase in freight rates be put in force forthwith. One speaker declared that either the Canadian trader must become bankrupt, or the company must become bankrupt. For the consummation of this dire prophecy he set a time limit, naming it at two years. On the present outlook, the speaker said, this prediction would surely come true.

The adoption of the report was then voted upon and carried practically unanimously. There was some opposition when the matter of Sir Henry Tyler's re-election for president came up for voting upon. His supporters, however, were far and away in the majority, the vote revealing but fifteen opponents. There was not much enthusiasm exhibited at the result of the poll; but the impression seemed to be that Sir Henry Tyler was doing everything possible in the interests of the shareholders and deserved re-election. The old board of directors and audits were re-elected.
