CITY TAXES.—On Saturday, the last day for allowing the discount on taxes, the City Clerk took in the sum of \$7,480.53. The receipts for last week were in the vicinity of \$15,000.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.—The closing meeting of the Summer School of Science will be held tomorrow evening instead of Thursday as at first intended. Those having received invitations to seats on the platform will please accept them for Wednesday.

SCOTSMEN ABROAD.—The New Brunswickers, Nova Scotians and Prince Edward Islanders in Boston and vicinity, will have a big picnic at Syp Pond, Arlington, next Thursday. The Dominion Marine Province Club is conducting the affair and a big attendance is expected.

THE RIFLE.—The Canadian riflemen who took part in the contest at Brierley captured a fair share of money prizes. England won the Knapton cup with 699 points, Canada standing second with 677. Canada stood fourth in the competition for the Mackinnon challenge cup.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE.—The Lieutenant-Governor has tendered Government House for the use of His Excellency and family. After dinner during their proposed trip in August, and every effort will be made to render their stay a pleasant one.

We are instructed to say that Mrs. Howland will receive at Government House on Monday, Wednesday, and each succeeding Wednesday. The visitors' books will be found in the hall, as customary.

WORKING THIS WAY.—A little boy about fourteen years old, who claimed to be from Ilver Charlton, was at Charlton last Wednesday. He said he was forced from home by his father's cruelty. He is a professional tramp, stealing rides on the train whenever he can. In this way he means to take in all principal points in the Maritime Provinces. He has already visited Quebec and New Brunswick, and is now on his way to P. E. Island.—Moncton Transcript.

THE MARKETS.—The market to day was fairly well attended, with the supply about the average. We quote prices as follows: Butter, 16 to 18c; cauliflowers, 7 to 10c; eggs, 9 to 10c; corn, 50 to 55c; gooseberries, 8 to 10c; strawberries, 12 to 14c; peas, 12 to 14c; turnips per bunch, 5 to 6c; hay, 45 to 50c; oats, 42 to 43c; potatoes, 30 to 35c; mackerel, 4 to 5c. A few loads of this season's hay were on sale. It was a little green, and sold at 40 to 45c per cwt.

BOY RECOVERED.—The body of Charles C. Shelton, of Philadelphia, who was accidentally drowned at the North Side on Saturday, was recovered this morning about 9 o'clock, by a man named Hector Heland. A number of boats were out searching all day yesterday for the body. The body was found near where the accident occurred, about fifty or seventy-five yards beyond where Miss Hill's was standing when Messrs. Beer and Campbell went to her assistance. The remains will be forwarded to Philadelphia for interment.

TO-NIGHT'S MEMORY LECTURE.—To-night's lecture promises to be an event of considerable importance, judging by what we read and hear of Prof. Loebner. It is an event not to be missed. SEPTUAGENARY ESTIMATES.—The supplementary estimates for the current year, 1894-95, were, as already reported by telegraph, laid on the table of the House of Commons on Thursday. The only items relating to the Island are these: To pay W. C. Harris, architect, for professional services rendered, 1886 to 1893, in connection with construction and maintenance of public buildings at Charlottetown, Montserrat and Summerside, inclusive of interior fittings, repaving walls, &c., \$213.35; Campbell's Cove Breakwater, works of reconstruction and repair, \$2,000; Kier's Shore—Extension to wharf and repairs, \$3,000; addition to steam communication during the season of 1894, 1 c, from the opening to the closing of Navigation between P. E. Island and the mainland, \$6,000.

COMMERCIAL TRAVELERS' PROTEST.—A circular has been issued to the members of the Dominion Commercial Travelers' Association, which says: "Owing to the number of enquiries and letters received from members of the association, we are unable to issue a circular to the members of the association, but we have been fully alive to the interests of the association at stake. The ablest legal opinions on the validity of the act have been obtained, and the recommendation of the directors is that the license be paid under protest in every instance, pending further action by the board."

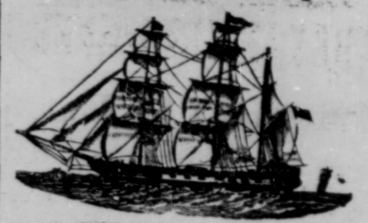
