Training Course Is Concluded

SUMMERSIDE — Course No. 81 graduates from the No. 2 (Maritime) operational training unit at C.F.B. Summerside on Friday. The course was made up of eight pilots, eight navigators, and 12 radio officers. All the graduates — who range from officers who have very recently reached "wings" standard to experienced officers who have been flying for many years in other types of work — will be going to Maritime squadrons at Comox, B.C., Greenwood, N.S., or remaining at Summerside with 415 (MP) Squadron. Those reporting to Comox will require no further training prior to reporting to their squadron as they will be flying Neptune aircraft in which they have been trained at this base. Those reporting to Greenwood or remaining at Summerside will undergo a further six weeks training at the Argus conversion unit at Greenwood prior to reporting to their squadrons. FURTHER TRAINING This further training will familiarize them with the four-engined Argus aircraft which is used by the east coast squadrons. The operational training unit was started in Greenwood in 1949 and moved to Summerside in 1953. Since 1949 the unit has graduated over 2300 pilots, navigators, radio officers, and flight engineers. Because of the absence of Group Captain G.A. Berry, D.F.C., C.D., on duty, Group Captain E.L. Badoux, D.S.O., D.F.C., C.D., C.O., CFB Greenwood was invited to officiate at the graduation ceremonies. After a short but interesting talk to the graduating class, he presented scrolls to each individual graduate. One of the graduates was F.L.H.R. Simons of the Royal Air Force who attended the O.T.U. course prior to taking up duties as an RAF exchange officer at CFB Greenwood, N.S. Before being posted to Canada, he was employed as a navigator with the RAF Coastal Command for several years. The ceremony at the local base was followed by an open house with family and friends of both staff and students were invited.

Twinning Project Approved

SUMMERSIDE — A project for the centennial year in Canada — that of twinning the town of Summerside with the town of Chandler, Quebec — received approval at Monday night's meeting of town council. The resolution, introduced in the council by Councillor Frances O. Perry and seconded by Councillor Herbert Schurman, says that it is considered as a gesture to establish contacts between the two towns "when problems of mutual interest may be discussed and proven beneficial to both communities." The town of Chandler chose Summerside in the "twinning" process at the recommendation of the municipalities of the province of Quebec, who asked towns and cities in that province to link up with other Canadian towns for the centennial year. Councillor Morrison said he thought the idea was a very good one, and Councillor Mellish told council that a steamer or license plate should be marked to indicate the "twinning" of the two towns. Councillor Morrison was of the opinion that either a motorcade or a ferry be employed to visit the town's "twin" in 1967.

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Council Will Take Action On Delinquent Tax Payers

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN By Laurie Chisholm The regular monthly meeting of town council here last night was informed that action and judgements are to be taken on delinquent tax payers in the town. Mayor Key told council that everyone in town is aware of the expansion of major services and that the town is faced with a tax problem and possible tax increase. But prior to any increase, a re-assessment of town properties must be undertaken, the mayor went on, indicating no tax rate increase next year, since estimates for such a re-assessment range between a year and one and one-half years. The re-assessment will be conducted by an outside firm, since they will be able to give an appraisal untainted by anything. He said it was very difficult to get a tax assessment. We must hold the line on the tax rate until the re-assessment is completed, Mayor Key said. "This is not only evident but paramount," he added.

The finance report, introduced at the meeting by town planner Joseph Brophy, showed current tax collection for September lowered the outstanding current taxes by \$49,355.00 to a figure of \$64,381.85, further lowered by a collection of \$7,104.12 on Friday past, leaving an amount of \$47,277.73 outstanding on 1966 taxes. Tax arrears amount to \$68,910.96.

VANDALISM Public works chairman Schurman told the meeting of vandalism at Timber Trail Park, and he said it was impossible for people to control the area. A letter was read at the meeting from local R.C.M.P. - C.O. Sergeant W.J.R. MacDonald who thanked the town for the co-operation given his force by the town police force. He said the assistance was appreciated. Meanwhile, town police will be asked to check on speeders in town more closely. The report from Police Chief S.D.A. Wannamaker showed seven speeding convictions during September. Councillor MacDonald commented that he felt seven was very light for the 30-day period. Councillor MacDonald added that he and the Mayor planned to discuss at length this problem with the chief later this week. Chief Wannamaker, in his report, stated that firecrackers are again making their appearance among juveniles and "several seizures" have been made. The largest seizure was of 20 packages from a youth who imported them from Winnipeg and was selling them to other children.

SLIGHTLY INJURED The police report also stated that it was learned that a child was slightly injured by an exploding firecracker. The chief's report stated that an appeal had been made through the press for parents to take any firecrackers found from their children, and if they learn of the source of supply, to notify the police office. A fatality — that of a three and one-half year old child — was the first traffic fatality in the town since 1963. Five accidents — all resulting in over \$100 damage — were reported during September. Two persons were injured. SDU-PWC (Continued from page one) vision for post-graduate studies. A study that tells us what difficulties would be needed to service this program. A study that tells us how facilities already present can be used in such a manner that capital expenditure is not duplicated. A former director of the Canadian Medical Retirement Fund, who served four years in the Canadian Army during the Second World War, Dr. Maloney said "only when such a study has been made and a satisfactory plan for dealing with the findings worked out should the hot little hands on either side be allowed to delve into the public purse."

The doctor mentioned that such a study for each province has been recommended by the Bladen Commission on Education and by the Duff Bernal Report on university government. SUGGESTS SOLUTION A member of the Charlottetown School Board for the past eight years, and former chairman of the school board's finance committee during most of its expansion program, Dr. Maloney, spoke on a solution. "The ideal solution is a compromise between the traditional

standard. The Mayor, in commenting on this aspect, said that the province must accept the Howatt Rental Accommodation regulations before the town would proceed to accept them. Section "D" of the letter was that owners of slum properties which are or become vacant be contacted with a view to securing the demolition of these properties. Councillor Schurman reported that five buildings have already been demolished and that other buildings will be demolished this year, with the owner's consent, starting November 1, under the Winter Works program. Councillor Schurman stated that he felt people in the town should avail themselves to this opportunity to rid the town of unsightly and dangerous buildings. He said that anyone wanting to have such buildings demolished should advise the town.

Councillor Schurman said there were two appeals to the by-law before court but in both cases, the persons involved were told to fix up their buildings in six weeks or have them torn down. Mayor Key read the final section of the recommendations to the council as follows: that a system of permits or licenses be instituted to govern the rental, sale and modification of housing accommodation in town. Mayor Key said that he was appreciative of the interest that the clergy is showing, and through this interest, he said, the raising of the standards of the town's citizens would be the inevitable result. He said it was good to have the "backing" of the clergy in such an important subject. Councillor MacDonald said he too wished to express appreciation to the clergy and a possible meeting with them would be in order. The mayor said a meeting would be held later this week.

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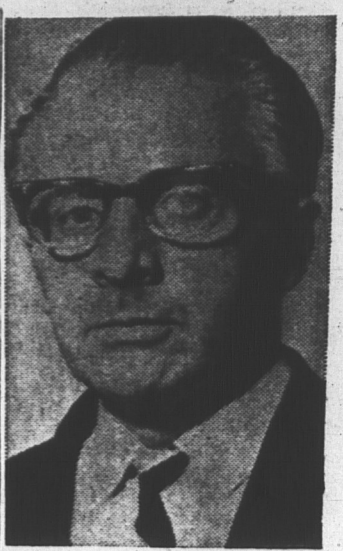
