WANT JOINT MEETING—Plans for the joint meeting of the pharmaceutical societies of the Maritime Provinces, to be held at Moncton, were discussed at a meeting of the executive of the N. B. Society. The annual meeting of the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society is scheduled to take place at Moncton in June, and in view of the fact that the Nova Scotia Society will open its annual meeting at Amherst on the same day, it was decided to have a joint meeting of all the Maritime pharmaceutical societies at Moncton. The date has been settled from July 19th to 29th inclusive, thus giving a ten-day camp, whereas last year camp was only for eight days. The charge will be the same as last year, \$10.00, covering board and registration. The camp site has also been decided on. This training camp provides a splendid holiday for girls from fifteen to nineteen years inclusive, under trained leadership, and careful supervision. A trained nurse will be in camp all of the time. A competent water-sports officer will have charge of the bathing and land sports officer for games and recreations and the Camp Mother, business manager and cook will see that all arrangements are well looked after and sent warm and comfy to bed in good time. Last year thirty girls attended the camp and had a delightful time and this year it is hoped there will be double the number if suitable accommodations can be secured.

### Provincial Legislature

corporation of the town of Souris empowering the town to borrow on debentures a sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of installing a system of Electric Lighting. On motion of Mr. H. D. McLean a clause was added providing that the bill shall not have any force or effect until ratified and confirmed by the majority of the property holders, as signified by a plebiscite taken under the direction of the town. The bill passed second reading.

An Act incorporating the Cape Wolfe Hall Company was read the second time and passed with amendments.

MON. MR. LEA introduced a bill to further amend an Act to incorporate The Prince Edward Island Dairy Association. The bill was given first reading.

HON. MR. JOHNSTON before moving the second order of the day (second reading of the County Courts amendment Act) made the statement that this bill was introduced by the leader of the government.

HON. MR. COX—it has had the consent of all the members of the government.

PREMIER BELL—I am doubtful of that.

MR. STEWART suggested that the members were breaking away from their leader.

The County Courts bill as originally introduced was passed without discussion.

The House went into committee for second reading of the Election Act.

MR. STEWART asked why a short amendment was not substituted instead of renewing the whole Act.

PREMIER BELL said it had to be considered that elections would have to be run and it was deemed advisable to put the amendments in the shape of a complete new Act.

MR. STEWART—I understand that the Act is not to come into force until after the by-election, so why the necessity of a new Act now?

MR. DEWAR—Supported Mr. Stewart's argument that a short amendment bill would do. I would save considerable printing expenses.

PREMIER BELL said the printing expenses had already been incurred.

MR. METHERELL said the boundary of the polls should be defined in the new Act. The bill should have been brought in earlier in the session.

MR. SAUNDEHS supported Mr. Stewart's contention that the amendments might have been in the form of an amendment bill, instead of putting the House under the necessity of reviewing the whole Act.

MR. STEWART asked the Attorney General if he had any knowledge of the bill as amended.

It was one of the most important bills on the statutes as it affected the constitution. If it was necessary that a whole new Act should be framed why was not the bill brought in earlier for the careful consideration of House, instead of being left till the closing hours of the session?

HON. MR. JOHNSTON said he did not understand that the bill

#### Canadian Coaster in Port

The Canadian Coaster, one of the fine new Canadian Merchant Marine ships arrived in Charlottetown Sunday evening and is loading potatoes at the Railway Wharf for shipment to Havana, Cuba.

The Canadian Coaster will remain in port until Wednesday, when she will carry away 60,000 bushels of Island potatoes.

This morning the loading operations were being carried on briskly.

This is the first trip to Charlottetown of the Canadian Coaster, which was built only last year at Collingwood. She is 1,000 tons larger than the Canadian Sapper and has a net tonnage of 22,000.

Captain Baker, of Halifax is in command. The vessel is a handsome and sea worthy craft. She carries a crew of twenty six, practically all Canadian born seamen. Messrs Buntain and Bell, the local agents for the steamer, ship her last fall to Havana 75,000 bushels of potatoes in two vesels. The present shipment of 60,000 bushels is one of the largest single shipments made from the province.

BAGOTA, COLOMBIA, May 8—A block of buildings in the commercial section of the city was destroyed by fire today and great quantities of merchandise were burned, containing a loss estimated at \$2,000,000. Many of the buildings were of modern construction. Six persons were injured.
