The Government deserve commendation for the promptness with which the case has been prepared, and if the Court will be good enough to promptly give judgment in the case we shall soon have the vexed question of constitutionality decided. The sooner the better for all concerned.—St. John Sun. THE tract of land secured by His Grace Archbishop Tache on which to settle repatriated French Canadians, is a beautiful and fertile section of the valley of the Qu'Appelle River. It is a grant from the Dominion Government on the colonization principle, and arrangements have been made with the C. P. R. for them to lend the head of fifty families each \$500, to be returned in ten years time. Each family will be given a homestead of 160 acres, which will have to be cultivated in accordance with the Dominion land regulations. THE Dominion note circulation on May 31st was \$15,686,630, against \$17,196,649 at the close of April, a decrease during the month of \$1,509,859. Almost the whole of this reduction, or \$4,435,000, occurred in the notes of large denomination, such as constitute a part of the bank reserves, and represents the withdrawal of gold during the month by the redemption of notes. The specie held by the assistant receiver-general on May 31st was \$1,192,780, in addition to which there was \$696,666 at Montreal, and \$476,667 in transit from England, making an available gold reserve of \$2,376,113. Since the opening of the month an additional amount of \$200,000 has been ordered from England to maintain the reserve. Our Advertisers. A.
