Amendments Sought In S'side Incorporation Act

Two resolutions, calling for amendments to the Summerside Incorporation Act of 1903, to be presented to the Legislative Assembly now in session at Charlottetown, were approved at a special meeting of Summerside Town Council last evening. Mayor W. A. Currie presided with all Councillors present. Ex-councillor W. E. Jenkins was an interested spectator. The first resolution pertaining to the official plan of the Town of Summerside reads as follows: "Whereas Section 131 of the Summerside Incorporation Act 1903, designates a plan made by James Campbell, land surveyor, and now filed in the office of the Town Clerk, to be the official plan of the Town of Summerside and descriptions of all lands proceeded against for taxes, rates and assessments are described by reference to such plan. "And whereas the town of Summerside is now conducting a re-valuation of all property within the said town.

"And whereas the said re-valuation is being conducted in accordance with, and the descriptions of all lands within the said town are designated by a plan known as a 'block plan' now filed in the office of the Town Clerk.
"Resolved that the Town Council of the Town of Summerside adapt the said 'block plan' together with the said plan of James Campbell or either, as the official plan of the Town of Summerside for the purposes already mentioned.
On suggestion of Coun. Dr. H. E. Clarke, town manager, J. A. Brophy explained that the Joseph Campbell plan was drawn up as the town existed back in 1876, and stated there of course has been a radical change in the town since that time. Mr. Brophy said the modern method is to refer to a property by a number in a certain zone which is designated by ward, block and lot number.
The other resolution reads: "Resolved that the Town Council of Summerside petition the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island, in session, to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act 1903, in the manner prescribed and attached hereto."
However the attachment was not released to the press as Mayor Currie explained that the suggested amendments in the petition to the Legislature may be greatly changed by that body so publication would not be made until later.

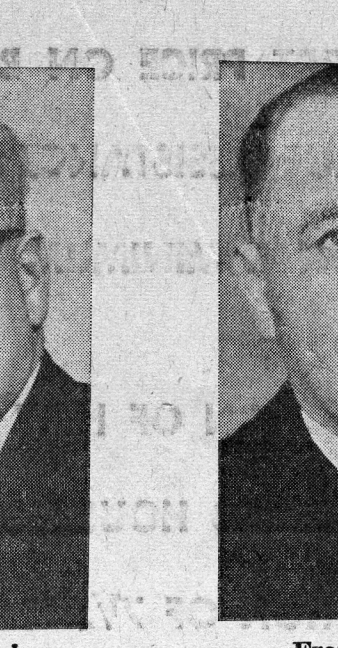

He discussed the great advances made in Tignish during the last fifty years under Liberal Governments and made particular reference to the great benefits in the area from unemployment insurance for fishermen, a measure due to a great degree to efforts of Mr. MacNaught.

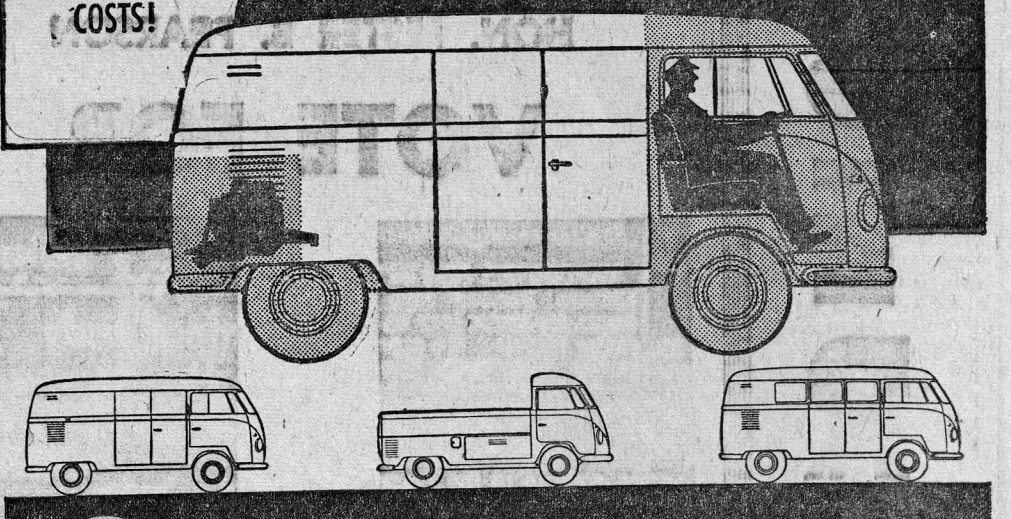
