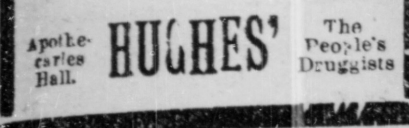

AT NORTH RIVER.

A Big Meeting on Saturday Evening.

A big meeting was held in the hall at North River on Saturday evening, Mr. Robert McKinley occupying the chair.
 Mr. Stewart addressed the meeting for an hour. He commanded the attention of the highly intelligent audience as he pressed home point after point of his indictment against the Tarte-Laurier administration and was frequently applauded. Sir Louis Davies followed. He harped upon the word "sold" which he said Mr. Stewart had used in connection with the oil question, and waxed warm as he asserted and reasserted that the Government of Canada never had any oil lands to sell. But he didn't tell the truth that Canadian oil wells, the working of which had previous to 1897 been a home industry, are now controlled by the great American syndicate which now regulates the price of oil according to its own sweet will, and that this is due to the action of the Tarte-Laurier Government, of which he is a member. Sir Louis repeated his statements concerning the government's promises, the tariff and other matters.
 Dr. McNeill and Premier Farquharson then addressed the meeting.
 A vote of thanks to the chairman passed unanimously.

Local and Other Items

—The Halifax is due about six o'clock to-morrow morning.
 —Regular meeting of Lodge Prince Edward, S. O. E., (W. R. degree) tonight at 8 o'clock. Advancement. Visiting brethren welcome.
 —Stetson's Company, to have played Quo Vadis at the Opera House tonight, have cancelled their engagement on account of unsuitable steamboat arrangements.
 —The snug sum of \$250 was realized at the bazaar recently held at Miscouche. In the contest for the most popular candidate Lefurgey won with 117 votes.
 —Attention is directed to the advertisement of the political meetings to be held in East Prince. The meetings are called by Mr. A. A. Lefurgey and Mr. Bell is invited to participate.
 —As a limited number of tickets only can be sold for the banquet to the South African Contingent, those requiring same should apply at once to the officers of the militia for them. Tickets may not be purchasable on Tuesday evening.
 —The steamer Campana arrived from Montreal on Saturday evening, and after discharging cargo proceeded to Pictou. She returns to Charlottetown this afternoon and will leave on return to Montreal about nine o'clock tonight. Her outward cargo will be made up largely of stock.

—At North River, on Saturday evening, Premier Farquharson said "The home market is always the best market." That sounds like an old Protectionist argument and it is usually true. Protect the home market for oats—by keeping out American corn.
 —Messrs Sentner McLeod & Co., have secured the store in the London House Block, lately occupied by W. H. Stewart & Co., and intend connecting it with their already large store, cutting an archway through. The new portion will be set apart for the sale of clothing and gentlemen's furnishings.

—There will be a District S. S. Convention in the Presbyterian Church at Clyde River on Monday afternoon and evening, Nov. 5th. All Sunday Schools in Lots 29, 30, 31, 32 and 65 are urged to send delegates. The Field Secretary and the Sunday School workers will be present. At the evening a silver collection will be taken in aid of the Provincial S. S. Association.

—There will be special cheap fares in connection with the arrival of the South African contingent at Charlottetown. On the day of the arrival of the contingent, the Prince Edward Island Railway will put in effect the following arrangements: A special train will leave Summerside at 2.35 p. m. standard time, returning leave Charlottetown at 10.30 p. m. standard time same night. From stations west of Charlottetown tickets will be issued by regular morning train and special train from Summerside, and from stations East of Charlottetown by regular afternoon train, good to return by special train to Summerside and intermediate stations same night, and regular morning trains to all stations on the following day at the same rates that were used in connection with the special days for the Provincial Exhibition. Fare for the round trip from Tignish \$1.25, Summerside 90 cents, Georgetown 80 cents and Souris 90 cents; intermediate stations at correspondingly low rates. Also from all stations by all trains on day of arrival of contingent, good to return the following day at one way first-class fare.
