GRIT STANDARD ELEVATOR.

Mr. Donald McNish, the recently elected Liberal representative for West Elgin, in the Ontario legislature, has disclaimed his right to the seat. Apparently the step has been taken in the hope of averting the exposure that the election trial threatened him with. But the Conservatives have decided not to allow him to escape in this manner and will fight the case to a finish. This is right. Liberal politicians who win their seats by corrupt means, and there are very many of them who do, should not be allowed to escape as easily as this man McNish would wish.

THE GERRYMANDER.

The Mail and Empire points out that under the principles of representation by population there is no excuse for inequality, and little room for gerrymandering. But under the plan which insists upon a strict and pedantic adherence to municipal boundaries inequality and gerrymandering can be effectively accomplished. The "kink" in the municipal boundary scheme, adds our contemporary, is the amount of Parliamentary representation that is allowed within such boundaries. If you take a county with 28,000 people and give it two members because it is Liberal, and another county with 78,000 people and give it only three members because it is Conservative, you accomplish a first-class gerrymander. In the United States municipal limits have been found to be an excellent covering for great injustice. In the Mullock plan the American idea is being religiously followed.

CONSERVATIVE PROSPECTS BRIGHT

MR. HUGH JOHN MACDONALD, the able leader of the Liberal-Conservative party in Manitoba, passed through Montreal a few days ago en route to Ottawa. Interviewed by the press Mr. Macdonald said he considered the prospects for a Conservative victory in the coming campaign in Manitoba as very bright. The Legislature a present consists of 33 Liberals to 7 Conservatives, but Mr. Macdonald believes that after the next campaign the position of the two parties will be reversed. During the past couple of years Mr. Macdonald has carried on an active campaign, and has personally visited every constituency in the province. The Conservatives will have a strong candidate in every constituency, and they will go into the fight with a united front. Asked when the elections would likely take place, Mr. Macdonald said the Legislature would meet on July 6th, and he believed it would then be dissolved, and that the elections would take place at the end of July or the beginning of August. If they did not take place then they would probably not take place till November. The election will be fought out almost entirely on local lines, economy being the principal issue. "Of course," Mr. Macdonald remarked, "there is nothing so uncertain as an election, but I believe the Conservative party will carry Manitoba. We have a united party, while our opponents are divided. We have a splendid lot of candidates; we are well organized, and while the Liberals have more money, the province, I believe, is ready for a change."

Some of its live citizens wanted a branch here ten years ago and their progressive efforts in this as other directions are now bearing fruit.

At the Domestic Animals Act meeting held on Tuesday evening it was resolved to keep up all animals included in the act. What Alberton wants now is a municipal act or inclusion in the provisions of the present general statute. Souris, a smaller place, has recently sought legislation and dear only knows we want it. 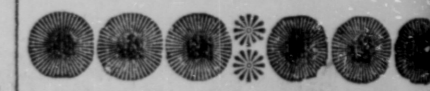
