At the entrance of the church there were very fine displays of handwork done by the boys and girls during the week.

Some of these illustrated community life and the ways in which the boy Jesus grew—"in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man." On another table was an interesting display of woodwork.

Rev. G. B. Cunningham was chairman and Mrs. Cunningham was organist. A large group of intermediate girls formed a choir. In the brief opening worship Rev. Mr. Cunningham was assisted by Rev. A. R. Wallis, who led in prayer. A welcome to those who had gathered was extended by Rev. Mr. Wallis.

BIRTHPLACE OF MISSIONARIES - Pictured above is the birthplace of George Nicol Gordon and James Douglas Gordon, the first missionary martyrs of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. This house which had been erected at Gordon's Cove, as early settlers built along the shore, was later moved to its present location two miles north of Alberton on the main highway and has been lived in by the Presbyterian Church of Prince Edward Island by the Gordon family. Mr. George Nicol Gordon, a nephew of the missionaries, had this house renovated in 1922, by putting in a new foundation, removing the gable window, shingling the roof and painting the exterior. Outwardly the building appears to be in good repair, but within the condition is not good, possibly as no one has lived in for many years. The mother of the martyrs lived there until her death. In 1813, John Gordon, who had married Mary Ramsay, settled at Casumpec, now Alberton, at the preaching station of the Presbyterian Church. His father, Robert, who had been a sergeant in the Revolutionary War of 1744, was entitled to three hundred acres of land in any part of British North America after the proclamation of peace in 1782. He eventually settled at Richmond Bay where his family was born. There were two or three Presbyterian families and few English settlers. After the erection of a preaching station, John was ordained an elder. He made strenuous exertions to educate his children and sometimes sent them to distant settlements where they might go to schools superior to that at home. George Nicol Gordon, the first Canadian martyr, was the fourth son and the fifth child in a family of nine and was born at Casumpec, now Alberton, April 21, 1822. He and his wife, Catherine Powell of London, England were murdered by the natives of the South Pacific groups at Erromanga or May 20, 1861. His brother James Douglas who replaced him also paid the supreme sacrifice on March 7, 1872. It would be gratifying to see this historic house preserved by the Presbytery of P. E. I. as a memorial to those brave missionaries who gave their lives.

Marciano Favored To Defeat Matthews Tonight

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP) - Rocky Marciano, the Brockton, Mass., blockbuster, remains a 2 to 1 favorite over stylish Harry Matthews of Seattle for their 10-round heavyweight elimination bout in Yankee Stadium tomorrow night.

The prize is a title shot at heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott in September. Although there will be no radio, television or theatre television, the best guess on the house is 25,000 spectators and a \$250,000 gate. The weatherman predicted mostly fair and continued warm weather with a high near 90. Fight time is 10 p. m. EDT.

The match figures to be the perfect pairing of the slugger and the boxer with Marciano pitting his power against the boxing skill of his older and more experienced opponent. Marciano will have the edge in weight, about 187 to 181, when they step on the scales tomorrow. But Matthews' long arms give him a seven-inch advantage in reach.

In the gym at Greenwood Lake, N. Y., Marciano has been a hard worker. He closed out his training yesterday with a viciousness that caused trainer Charley Goldman to shorten the drill. Matthews, working indoors in downtown Manhattan, has coasted through his workouts. Never once did he open up for the spectators. He confined his boxing to one sparring partner, Keene Simmons.

LONDON, July 27 - (Reuters) - Lord Francis Scott, 73, uncle of the Duchess of Gloucester, died Saturday in a train in Paddington Station. One-time aide-de-camp to the Viceroy of India, Lord Scott for some years was leader of the European members of the Kenya Legislature.
