## MARKETS New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—Profit-taking poised a brief threat to the stock market last week, but it recovered strongly and moved on to new heights.

The Bank of England lowered its bank rate to three per cent from 3 1/2 per cent. That means easy money in the sterling bloc. Stocks rushed ahead immediately in London and in New York there was such a scramble to buy stocks that price reporting facilities were swamped briefly. The strength in stocks here was branded purely psychological or coincidental.

A more fundamental piece of news was the fact that U. S. corporations issuing paid three per cent more cash dividends in March than a year ago.

On Monday last week the stock market edged ahead slightly.

The next day there was a routine reaction that cut prices down considerably. Volume was well below the daily average so far this year, and before the close many prices recovered well from their lows.

The market rallied Wednesday with such vim that it retraced all of the average loss of the previous day.

The Bank of England cut its discount rate on Thursday. Buyers thronged into the New York market. The higher levels couldn't be maintained, however, and the market slipped to a lower close.

Friday found prices advancing steadily with buying emphasis swinging from one group to another.

Canadian issues closed the week higher. Canadian Pacific added 1/2, International Nickel was up 3/4, Distillers Secogram advanced 3/4, and Dome Mines was up 1/2. Hiram Walker slipped 1/4.

On the American stock exchange Giant Yellowknife was up 1/4.

## Federal Gov't May Face New Demands For Increased Veterans' Allowances

OTTAWA (CP)—The government likely will face new demands this week for increased allowances for Canada's 40,000 "burned-out" veterans and their dependents.

Higher allowances are expected to be sought by opposition parties and representatives of the Canadian Legion at meetings of the 31-member Commons veterans affairs committee which held its organizational meeting Friday. Walter Tucker L-Rosthern was named chairman.

The committee was set up to give detailed study to a number of bills affecting veterans which have been introduced in Parliament by the government. However, the terms of reference do not permit members to discuss veterans legislation not specifically referred to the committee.

During debate on establishment of the committee opposition party members complained that they would be prevented from discussing allowances unless amendments were made to the War Veterans Allowance Act and sent to the committee. They also noted that Prime Minister St. Laurent indicated April 30 that the government does not plan to increase allowances this session.

**MEETS WEDNESDAY**

The committee will hold its first meeting Wednesday to hear general representations by the Canadian Legion. It is expected the legion will urge increases in allowances and that the committee's terms of reference be broadened to permit members to discuss all their representations, including those for higher allowances.

Opposition party members of the committee also are expected to press for a review of current allowances and a broadening of the terms of reference. Col. A. J. Brooks PC-Royal moved a motion in the Commons to achieve this but it was ruled out of order by Speaker, Rene Beaudin.

Under the War Veterans Allowance Act the basic allowance now is \$50 a month for single veterans and \$90 for married veterans. The legion and opposition members want these rates raised to \$60 and \$120, respectively.

Total permissible income ceilings now allowed are \$720 a year for single recipients and \$1,200 for married men. The government has been urged to raise these ceilings to \$1,200 for single men and \$2,000 for married recipients.

Existing rates were described in the Commons by opposition members as completely inadequate in the face of today's cost of living. They said the inadequacy of the rates is the most urgent veterans problem facing the country.

## Gives Outline Of Development In Quebec Mines

Quebec (CP)—The chief of technical information in the Quebec mines department said Wednesday it took 50 years for Quebec's mineral production to reach the \$250,000,000 mark but that "in a small fraction of that time" production will reach \$500,000,000.

Jean-Paul Drole, addressing the 68th annual meeting of the Engineering Institute of Canada, outlined the work being done in Quebec's Ungava, Gaspé peninsula, Chibougamau, and the Eastern Township's asbestos belt, focal points of Quebec's expanding industrial development.

The iron ore company of Canada will ship the first 1,000,000 tons of raw iron ore this summer from the heart of Quebec's bleak Ungava territory. The ore will move along a 360-mile railway linking Knob Lake with Sept Iles.

Electric power for mining operations is from a hydro-electric plant at Menihic in Labrador, just across the Quebec border.

Another hydro plant shared with Gulf Power and Paper Company will supply power for the sand-dumping equipment and the ship-loading dock at Sept Iles.

At Allard Lake, another 100 miles east of Sept Iles, the world's largest and richest titanium ore deposit now is being mined.

**COPPER RESERVES**

In the eastern tip of Gaspé peninsula Gaspé Mines Limited are developing copper ore reserves estimated at 9,000,000 tons of pure copper and are building a concentrator with the largest initial milling capacity ever attempted in Canada, Mr. Drole said.

Electric power will be transmitted by overland and marine cable from the giant Bersimis power project on the north shore of the St. Lawrence.

In Chibougamau, 150 miles north of Lake St. John, Opemiska Copper has a small mill in operation. Campbell Chibougamau Mines is building a large concentrator. A new nickel-copper smelter and refinery to treat 200 tons daily each of copper and nickel-copper concentrates will soon be located in the area.

In the Eastern Townships asbestos belt, the world's largest producer of the fibre, nearly 1,000,000 tons is shipped annually. Expansion now under way includes conversion of Canadian John Manville's Jeffrey mine to underground operations.

Another new project, Mr. Drole said, is that of placing the United Asbestos Corporation property back in production with a new mill of 4,000 tons daily capacity. In order to uncover the asbestos deposits 30,000,000 cubic yards of clay, sand, and gravel will be dredged from the bottom of Black Lake.

number of Frenchmen at Dien Bien Phu was comparatively low. The bulk of the private soldiers were Chinese, Moroccan, Viet Namese and Foreign Legionnaires, most of them Germans.

It also was reported in Paris that rebel troops Monday captured a military post manned by Viet Namese only 30 miles from Hanoi in the first notable operation since Dien Bien Phu fell.

The fighting broke out on the western perimeter of the delta as rebels attacked four posts held by Viet Namese troops. They captured one in the Phully area, south of Hanoi, but were beaten off from the others.

**MINOR SETBACK**

French officers regard this as a minor setback. They are confident that the rice-rich, vital Red river delta area of Hanoi is safe from attack until the monsoon rains end in September.

French quarters admit the situation in the delta is "far from good," but they base their confidence on the weather and rebel losses at Dien Bien Phu. They said the rebels suffered between 20,000 and 30,000 casualties, including 10,000 dead or seriously wounded.

The Vietminh are estimated to have 30,000 regulars and 70,000 guerrillas massed in the delta region.

In the delta today, for the first time in 15 days, Communist units made an attempt to cut rail and road communications with Hanoi's supply port of Haiphong.

## U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND (AP)—The magazine says the steel industry is being talked about appears to be sweeping through the steel industry.

In its weekly summary of the metal-working industry, the magazine says three steelmaking districts which felt a decline a few weeks ago now have climbed to about 80 per cent of capacity.

These are Wheeling, W. Va., with 84 per cent, Chicago at 80 and Cleveland at 78.

Throughout the industry, the national rate rose one point last week with gains showing in five districts, declines in three and five remaining unchanged.

"Standing out currently for its booming performance is Inland Steel Co. in the Chicago district," Steel reports. "Inland's ingot production for the week ended May 16 was scheduled at 103.7 per cent of capacity."

The magazine says Inland's lowest production rate this year was 83.7 at the beginning of March and that the rate has been climbing steadily ever since.

Hand-to-mouth ordering of steel still prevails. Steel continues, with users not ordering until they have immediate need and then wanting quick delivery.

## Communist Radio Reports Gen. De Castries Prisoner

HONG KONG (Reuters)—The Communist Vietnamese radio said today Gen. Christian de Castries was taken prisoner when rebels captured Dien Bien Phu last Friday. It made no mention of the French nurse who was the only woman in the northern Indo-China fortress.

The radio quoted a Vietminh high command communique which said more than 16,000 French Union troops led by the 51-year-old general were killed, wounded or captured in "the greatest victory ever recorded" by the rebels.

The communique did not mention Miss Genevieve de Galard-Terraube, 29, who tended the wounded for five weeks and was awarded the Legion of Honor shortly before the garrison fell.

**CAPTURED BEFORE**

De Castries, whose family has provided France with soldiers for five centuries, is no stranger to a prisoner of war life. He was captured by the Germans during the Second World War and made three vain escape tries before succeeding on his fourth.

He was promoted from colonel to brigadier-general when Dien Bien Phu's prolonged holdout against overwhelming odds caught the imagination of the world. There was complete silence on his fate for three days after the fall.

The communique said 16 colonels, 353 other officers and 1,396 non-commissioned officers were killed or captured.

It said that the rebels had "knocked down" during the 57-day battle a total of "more than 21 battalions and ten companies, numbering more than 16,000 crack troops."

**LALANDE MENTIONED**

It mentioned Col. Andre Lalande 41, but did not say whether he was alive. Lalande had commanded the southern bastion of "Isabelle," named after his year-old daughter which held out for several hours after the main fortress fell.

The prisoners, reported to be marching northward toward camps near the border of Communist China, are being well-treated and given "adequate care," the radio said.

It reported that aside from loss of troops, 62 planes were shot down or destroyed and all French arms, ammunition and other equipment captured.
