POLICE COURT.—One drunk, Hugh McNeill, was fined \$1 this forenoon.

SCOTT ACT.—Two new summonses, first offences, were served last evening. They are returnable on Tuesday.

A PRETTY SIGHT.—Forty sail of United States and Nova Scotia fishermen went out of Malpeque harbor this morning.

SUPREME COURT.—The case of Francis Finnigan and another vs. Francis Bradley and others is still before the court.

PUBLIC MEETINGS.—The public meetings held in the Upper Hall have been discontinued for the summer months.

GOSPEL MEETING.—Railway Gospel Meeting to-morrow in J. D. McLeod's Hall at 4 p. m. Lesson: Isaiah 52 Chap. Open to all.

DISBANDED.—The men at the militia camp, Brighton, were disbanded to-day, and most of them have left for their homes.

CANADIAN IMMIGRATION.—The immigration returns for the half year just ended show 84,000 arrivals against 70,000 for the same period last year, and 40,000 actual settlers against 36,000 last year.

A NEW BUG.—The Ayr, Ont., Recorder tells of a bug, discovered by B. O. Howell of that neighborhood, which assassinates the potato bug. Mr. Howell should distribute his new bug over the province.

FARM SOLD.—We understand that Dr. J. G. McKay, of Clifton, New London, yesterday sold his farm of one hundred acres, together with all his stock of implements, etc., to Mr. Lemuel Silliphant, who has recently returned from Texas. The price paid was \$4,500.

MUSICAL.—The Artillery Band will give an open air concert on Queen Square this evening, commencing at seven o'clock. At the conclusion of the performance the members of the Band will be treated to a supper at the Bijou by their leader, Mr. John Worth.

Knight and Thomas Hall this afternoon captured thirteen salt water trout in our Souris River, just below Scully's Point, which weighed eleven pounds. One of the thirteen weighed 2 1/2 lbs. This is the first catch of the season. Rollo Bay with Bay Fortune has not yet given such a basket."

TO-MORROW.—Preaching in the Y. M. C. A. Hall by Rev. Edward Whitman at 11 o'clock and 6.30 o'clock, when the claims of infidelity will be considered. Theme in the morning: "The Bible the word of God, authentic in statement and authoritative in teaching." SUCCESSFUL GARDENING.—We give credit to Mr. Holl for the excellence of his garden, and Mr. Holl, no doubt, deserves credit. But the results of the efforts of Mr. John Colwell, who, notwithstanding his age, has still the enthusiasm and the ability of a first-class gardener, should not be overlooked. Mr. Colwell can even now show potatoes of this year's growth, each of which are as big as a good sized fist, and two of which, weighed yesterday, turned the scale at a half pound. Mr. Colwell has also new peas well developed.

ANOTHER MIRACLE.—A miraculous cure is reported from the Shrine of St. Anne de Beauce, Quebec. Last Monday morning the pilgrims who had made the annual visit to the shrine, under the direction of the Redeemerist Fathers, returned to Montreal and brought with them Nellie McCarthy, a child 12 years old, who had been suffering from hip disease for five years. She could only get along with great difficulty by the use of crutches. The crutches were left at St. Anne's shrine among the thousand other mementos of like miracles, and the girl was as if she had never been troubled with the disease. As may be imagined her widowed mother is overjoyed.

STARBUCK AFFRAY.—The brig, Twilight, Capt. McKenzie, of Halifax, arrived here this week from St. Pierre, Martinique. On the 14th of June, when the Twilight was at St. Pierre, a row took place between two of her sailors, George Thompson, of Liverpool, England, stabbing Spurgeon McLeod, of Murray Harbor, P. E. I. McLeod was put in hospital and Thompson tried and transferred to first English port for further trial. Last night he was taken from the Twilight and lodged in jail here, and to-day he is before Magistrate Daughine. It looks now as if the country will be called upon to board him till the October term of the supreme court.—Lancetbury Progress.

THE CUMBERLAND CONTEST

Dickey's Majority 762.

AMHERST, July 13. In the election in Cumberland to-day for House of Commons, Dickey (Conservative) was elected by 762 majority over Casey, Prohibition.

The Boulanger-Floquet Duel.

PARIS, July 13. The duel between Prime Ministers Floquet and Boulanger was fought this morning. The two gentlemen, attended by their seconds, met in the vicinity of Paris at 10 o'clock this morning. Swords were used and both contestants were wounded. The duel occurred on Count Dillon's estate at Newilly Sur-Seine, a short distance from the city. General Boulanger was wounded in the arm and neck. His wounds are not dangerous. Floquet's hand was scratched by General Boulanger's sword. Further than this he was not touched. Dr. Monod, who is attending Boulanger, has issued a bulletin regarding his condition. It says there is a deep wound on the right side of the General's neck that caused marked difficulty in respiration. He is unable to give an opinion as to what turn the case may take. LATER.—The condition of the General is serious. High fever has been succeeded by extreme prostration. His respiration is rapid and sometimes very difficult. The doctors are unable to form a definite opinion as to the General's chance of recovery.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, July 13. About four hundred employes of Booth's lumber mills here are on a strike to-day, but no serious trouble is anticipated. Only one arrest has been made, and the police are keeping a vigilant oversight of the strikers. Serious Indian disturbances are threatened in British Columbia, owing to the arrest of an Indian for murder, and the local government posse sent in a detachment of D Battery to Skeena. It is said that the lives of the whites in the district are at the mercy of the Indians. The Government has decided to appeal from the judgment of Chief Justice Ritchie of the Supreme Court, in the famous Ayr customs case. Count Esterhazy, the Hungarian Colonization agent, is in the city.

News From Wimbledon.

TORONTO, July 13. The Mail's special cable says: "Sergt. Miner, 71st, is the sole representative of the Dominion of the second stage for the Queen's prize. There are none under 87 in the three hundred. In the Martin's cup at 600 yards, Lieut. Smith scored 31, getting a prize. Other scores were: Lieut. Fiske, 30; Sergt. Case, 28; Lieut. Dover, 26; Gunner Campbell, 22; Gunner Wilson, 22; Sergt. Adams, 16."

Montreal News.

MONTREAL, July 13. The arbitrators in the case of Henry Judah vs. the Atlantic and Northwest Railway, have rendered their award, giving Mr. Judah \$30,575. The Company offered \$15,000 and Judah claimed \$100,000. The banks have come to an unanimous agreement to oppose Premier Mercier's new commercial tax both tooth and nail, and will carry the matter, if needed, to the highest court in the Empire.

A Terrible Loss.

CAPETOWN, July 13. It is believed that three hundred lives were lost in the debris of the coal mine fire. The damage to the mine is estimated at \$100,000. The calamity was caused by the breaking of the hauling wire while the shafts were being changed. The rescuers who subsequently explored the mine were compelled to use dynamite to clear the passages to corpses.

Another Counterfeiter Arrested.

SARINIA, Ont., July 13. W. O. Parsons, a prominent contractor, was arrested at Theford last night on a charge of counterfeiting. A large quantity of bogus bills and American silver was found on his person. He is said to be connected with a gang of counterfeiters operating in that section.

Serious Trouble Feared.

LONDON, July 13. One British regiment now in Egypt has been ordered to Zululand, and a detachment from Aldershot will replace it in Egypt. It is generally believed serious trouble will soon ensue in South Africa.

Sir Adams Archibald Nominated.

HALIFAX, July 13. The Colchester Liberal-Conservatives to-day unanimously nominated ex-Governor Sir Adams Archibald. The Liberals meet on Tuesday to place a man in the field.

Emperor William's Departure.

BERLIN, July 13. Emperor William departed to-night on a journey to St. Petersburg. The royal yacht Alexander, bearing the Emperor and suite, sailed from Potsdam at 10 p. m.

Rescued.

LONDON, July 13. Forty-three whites and 400 natives have been rescued from the Ouro mine in South Africa.
