Stalingrad Revisited

Pity the lot of historical writers in Soviet Russia! Here is an amusing example of their difficulties: In early 1950 an article in Pravda, commemorating the seventh anniversary of the Stalingrad victory, said: "In the course of the Stalingrad battle the whole range of Stalin's foresight was demonstrated."

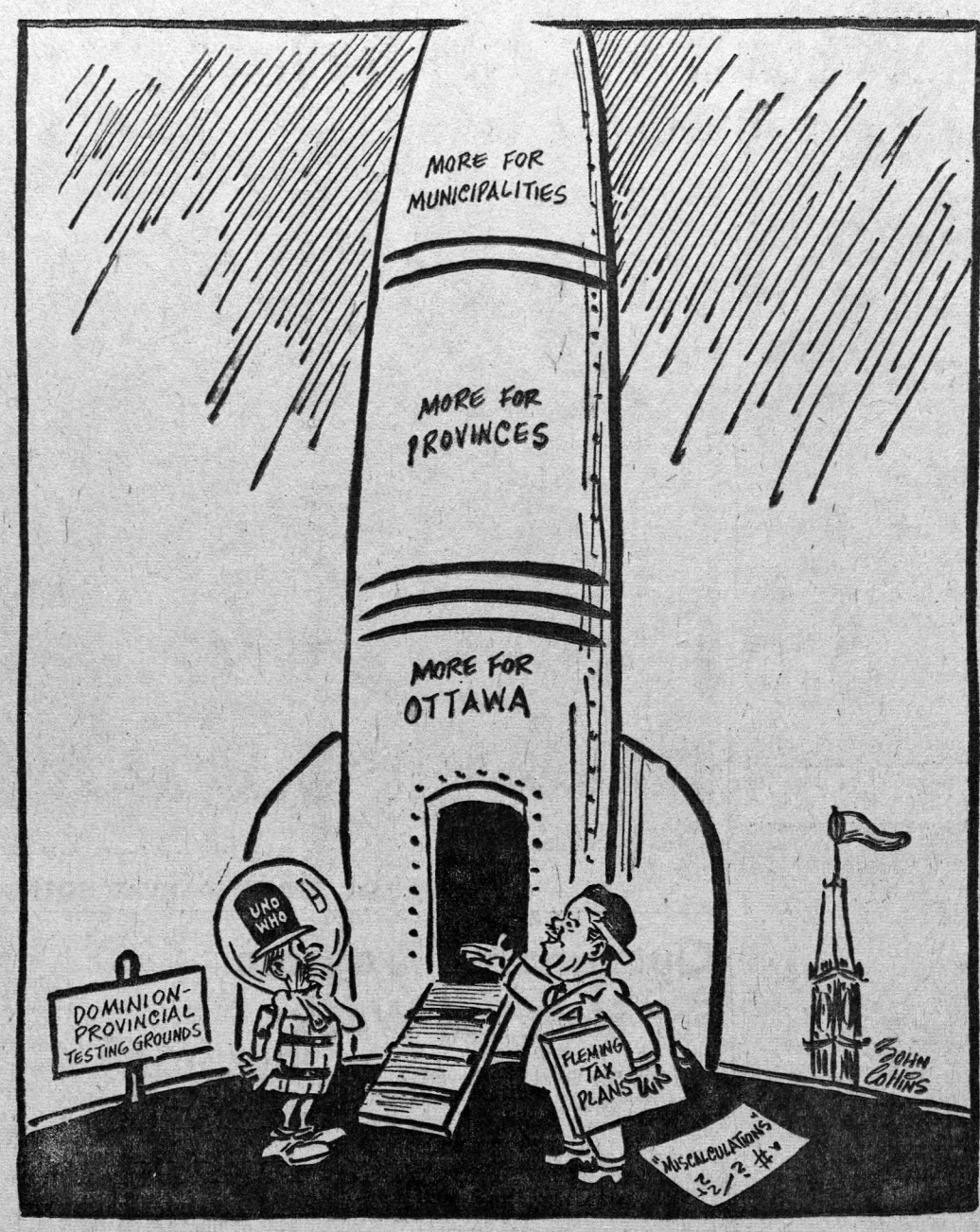

Production Down

OTTAWA (CP)—Motor vehicle production was 27 per cent lower last month than a year ago but still was almost 11 per cent above output two years ago, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

Vertical Take Off Jet

LONDON (Reuters)—The first Soviet vertical-takeoff jet plane, a craft without wings or propellers—has been tested successfully the Soviet news agency Tass said Friday. An article in the technological publication Tekhnicheskii Molodezhi said the Turbulet is the first step toward air travel without airfields.

Baby's Diaper Rash Problems

From time to time, I receive letters from mothers complaining that their children have developed diaper rash. They seem surprised that diaper rash can occur during the cold winter months.

MAY BE YOUR FAULT

If your infant is bothered by it, chances are it may be your fault. Diaper rash is aggravated by lack of cleanliness and irritation of the baby's tender skin.

FURTHER PROTECTION

There's a lot more you can do, too, to protect your child from this irritation rash. For example, use rubber or plastic pants on the youngster only while traveling or making brief visits, when changing is inconvenient.

LAUNDERING DIAPERS

You must pay particular attention to laundering the diapers. The Journal of the American Medical Association reported that, as a rule, commercial laundering was much more effective in removing and inhibiting growth of ammonia-forming bacteria and in removing irritating detergents than home-laundrying methods.

ON DOCTOR'S ADVICE

Methylbenzethonium and BH 3104 are effective inhibitors of urea decomposition, according to the Journal, but they should be used with the doctor's advice. In addition, the diapers should be given warm and hot rinses and two soappings at 180 degrees.

RETAIL SALES UP

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's retail sales showed a slight increase in the July-September period last year. Cash sales increased while those on credit dropped. Over-all sales rose by \$36,300,000 to \$3,678,100,000 from \$3,641,800,000 in the similar 1957 period, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday.

CHAIN STORE SALES UP

OTTAWA (CP)—Chain store sales rose 1.5 per cent during December but at a slower rate than the average increase of 7.6 per cent in the full year, the bureau of statistics reported Friday. Sales in the 12-month period rose to \$2,847,745,000 from \$2,647,055,000 and in December to \$336,461,000 from \$331,433,000.
