Editorial Notes.

The United States Senate have amended the "Tariff Bill" by putting lumber on the "free list."

All good men, more particularly all good Irishmen, will rejoice that the "Assassination Club" has been entrapped.

His greatest enemies will hardly deny that the Pope has taken a sensible and Christian course with reference to the Irish difficulty.

Incendiary Fire

CURRENT NOTES.

The United States owns 3,400,000 acres of land in Mississippi, and would be glad to sell it.

Birdseye maple, which sells for \$160 per 1000 feet in England, is used for firewood in Western North Carolina.

The Cabinets of Vienna, Berlin, Rome and St. Petersburg agree to accept, in principle, the views of Lord Granville, on the Egyptian question as detailed in his circular note, of the 3rd inst., to the English representatives abroad.

Berlin despatches reiterate the oft-repeated assertion that Germany is earnestly preparing for war with her Eastern neighbor.

Winnipeg a year ago had four wholesale grocery and provision houses, whose combined stocks were valued at \$300,000. Now it has nine such houses with stocks valued at \$750,000 to \$1,000,000.

Returns of the Clyde ship-building trade for 1882 show that year to have been one of great and unexampled activity.

According to a writer in the Atlantic Monthly for January the blacks in the South are not much better off under the flag of freedom than they were under the old regime of slavery.

Personal—Gossip.

Flotow, the composer, is dead.

Sir Alexander Campbell, Minister of Justice, has been seriously ill the past week. He has now so far recovered as to be able to resume his duties.

The death is announced of Mr. Edward H. Harrington, one of the oldest barristers of Nova Scotia and for many years a respected resident of Halifax.

Attachments have been issued against F. H. Baker, who is extensively interested in lobster factories in different parts of Nova Scotia, and also publisher of the Halifax May Flower, a fortnightly paper.

Mr. Geo. Munro, the best friend of Dalhousie College, has given another substantial evidence of his friendship by endowing three new tutorships—Latin, Greek and Mathematics—at \$1,000 per annum each.

Advices from the State of Chiapas, Mexico, are to the effect that cholera has made fearful ravages there. The number of victims is immense. Many bodies have been devoured by dogs, because they are so stricken were at once abandoned. The epidemic broke out last July.

Mr. W. C. Van Horne, General Manager of the Canadian Pacific, states that the reports regarding the proposed appointment of Mr. C. J. Brydges as General Manager of the Canadian Pacific are without foundation, and that no change in the management of the road is contemplated.

A story is told of a Vermont farmer who, being continually annoyed by the mysterious disappearance of apples from his trees, finally planted by the roadside trees of an early ripening variety, with a sign inviting passers by to help themselves. It is said that the plan was effectual in preserving his most valuable trees.

There are now in the Maine State prison twenty men undergoing life sentences for the crime of murder in the first degree. It seems that there is a strong sentiment in the Maine Legislature for the restoration of the death penalty for murder, and a bill will probably be reported by the Judiciary Committee.

Andrew Paul and Anthony Saccobie, two chiefs of the Milicete Indians, from Fredericton, N. B., had an interview with Sir John on Friday. They complain that their local agent has treated them badly. Sir John promised that their grievances should be enquired into. The deputation was introduced to Sir John by Hon. Mr. Costigan.

The Czar, recollecting the assassination of President Lincoln, regards the theatre as a place of danger; but being a lover of music, he would be in a quandary to safely satisfy his tastes were it not for the telephone. He has had a wire laid to his Nihilist-besieged castle at Gatchina from the Marinsky theatre at St. Petersburg, and from the opera house to the bomb-proof palace are conveyed to the ears of timid royalty all the music, vocal and instrumental, and the dialogue, and the popular applause of every opera there performed.
