Revolution.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.

Passengers who arrived by the steamer
San Pablo yesterday report there is excitement
in Honolulu over the threatened
revolution against King Kalahana. It
is said that the Germans and Chinese are
at the bottom of the trouble, and that the
latter will wage a war of extermination
with the Hawaiians, during which the
Europeans will gain control.

Ah-Fong, a millionaire Chinese operator,
is fostering the insurrection. The Chinese
on the island number about 30,000. The
entire available force of the King will
not exceed 30,000, and a force of
1,000 white men could overthrow the
government. Colonel Lane, commander of
Delong Grand Army Post, at Honolulu,
sent by the San Pablo a letter to Great
Commander Solomon, of California, saying—
" We are only waiting for arms to begin
the racket."

The Turkish Convention.

LONDON, June 28.

In the House of Lords this afternoon
Lord Salisbury declared it in the public
interest to lay the papers relating to the
Anglo-Turkish convention in reference to
Egypt on the table. The Government, he
said, had acceded to delay on signing the
convention, which Turkey had asked on
the definite understanding that Treaty
should be ratified by Turkey on Monday
without fail.

Stipendiary Motton this morning gave
judgment in the test case of the driver of
the street car summoned for violation of
the Sunday law. He finds him guilty and
imposed a fine of \$8. The company
appealed at once to the County Court.

Fatal Riot.

NEW ORLEANS, June 29.

At Oakridge, yesterday morning, a negro
was arrested for indecent assault. His
friends attempted a rescue. A riot ensued,
in which six negroes and two white men
were killed, and three constables dangerously
wounded.
